GAOL SENTENCE

FOR R. B. RUSSELL

The First of the Winnipeg Strike

Leaders to Be Tried, Must Serve

Two Years in the Penitentiary.

Winnipeg, Dec. 27.—R. B. Russell

strike leader, was this morning sen-

tenced to two years on each of the

six seditious conspiracy counts, and

one year on the count of committing

a common nuisance, the sentences to

run concurrently, making two years

in all.

Russell was led from the court-

room by Deputy Sheriff John Fy-

niger, with the cheers of his friends

and supporters ringing in his ears.

One of those who led in the demon-

stration for Russell, William Staples

of 390 Wardlaw Avenue, a machin-

ist in the Canadian Pacific Railway

shops, was taken into custody by

Captain C. F. Wheeler, on the order

of the deputy sheriff.

It appeared for a moment as

though that forceful demonstration

was about to take place.

Mr. Justice Metcalfe had left the

bench and the court was adjourned.

When the crowd was preparing to

file out, a voice rang out, "Three

cheers for Bonnie Russell."

The marble pillars resounded with

the "Hurrahs" which completely

drowned the cries of order from the

court crier. Staples, waving his

hand, shouted, "A tiger," but before

this could be done the deputy sher-

iff's staccato command sent the court

bailliff into the cheering crowd, and

Staples was arrested.

HAIG TO RECEIVE

FAMILY ESTATE

A Movement is on Foot in England

to Purchase Bemerseyde Castle on

the Tweed as a Further Reward

for the Field Marshal.

London, Dec. 27.—In the old days

England rewarded her victorious gen-

erals with great estates. Blenheim,

still the seat of the Dukes of Marl-

borough, was the great duke's re-

ward for winning British victories,

and Wellington received 20,000 acres

of English land for beating Napo-

leon.

The generals of the great war re-

ceived money grants only, but the

British people have determined that

Field Marshal Haig is entitled to fur-

ther recognition. A movement has

been started to present him with the

castle and estates which were the

cradle of his family, and which have

been its home for 700 years.

Bemerseyde on the Tweed is one of

the most famous border castles in

Scotland. It is now in the posses-

sion of the field marshal's cousin,

Lieut.-Col. Haig, who is willing to

sell it for about \$215,000. A fund

for this purpose is being raised by a

committee the treasurer of which is

the lord mayor of London.

The Romance of the Okanagan



"The Cecil Rhodes of the Okanagan" has been the title given Mr. J. M. Robinson of Naramata, Okanagan Valley, B. C.

It is due to his energy and vision that the valley is now covered with smiling orchards and is one of the assets of the Dominion.

From his newspaper office in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, in 1894, Mr. Robinson observed a family of eight, with their savings of ten thousand dollars, leaving for California. That they were seeking a milder climate led him to remark that it was to be regretted that Canada should lose such citizens and that there was not a Canadian California.

Two years later Mr. Robinson and his party went to Rossland, at the time of the mining-boom and formed a prospecting party who went into the Okanagan valley and located claims near Peachland and established Camp Hewitt. The hills refused to uncover their storehouse of metals. With courage they faced the conviction that their hopes were blighted. However, if the hills of Peachland revealed that the greatest wealth lay in the surface soil which, when cultivated and planted, produced fruit and vegetables, unsurpassed.

At the ranch of Mr. Lambly, gold miner, Mr. Robinson was amazed to learn that they had been grown on the ranch. He at once realized that he had found that for which he had been searching, the Canadian California. Boundless possibilities lay in the great reaches of upland, covered with scattered pines and sage brush. A tract purchased on the beach was called Peachland, the name carrying the advertisement with it. Eastern people then inquired if "Peaches grew in Peachland" so there truly was much in a name. To have one hundred families occupying the land that one family occupied; to see the barren, parched hills the homes of thousands of Easterners was the dream of the "Father of
