The First of the Winnipeg Swift Leaders to Be Tried, Must Serve Two Years in the Penitentiary.

Winnipeg, Dec. 27.-R. B. Russell strike leader, was this morning sentenced to two years on each of the six seditious conspiracy counts, and one year on the count of committing a common nuisance, the sentences to run concurrently, making two years

Russell was led from the court coom by Deputy Sheriff John Pyniger, with the cheers of his friends and supporters ringing in his ears, One of those who led in the demonstration for Russell, William Staples of \$90 Wardlaw Avenue, a machinist in the Canadian Pacific Railway shops, was taken into custody by Captain C. F. Wheeler, on the order of the deputy sheriff.

It appeared for a moment as though that forceful demonstration was about to take place.
