ACCUSE HIM OF THROWING WIFE OUT OF WINDOW

Charles Daley of Pittsburg Arrested Yesterday on a Sensational Charge

PITTSBURG, Pa., Tuesday. — Accused of having thrown his wife from the third story of her home on the North Side, Charles Daley, 45 years old, was arrested this morning after Mrs. Daley had been found lying unconscious on the pavement in front of the house early today. Daley denies the charge and insists that his wife jumped from the window. According to Mrs. Daley she and her husband had a quarrel and he struck her and tried to choke her. A pitched battle ensued and finally forcing her to the window he picked her up and deliberately threw her out. Daley on the other hand declares that his wife was trying to escape from him and that she jumped from the window not realizing at the time what she was doing. Mrs. Daley is seriously injured.

The next class called was the 2-minute class, there being three starters, viz., Midget, owned by T. Ellsworth and driven by Ernie McGowan of Memramcook, Queen of Hearts, and Prince, owned by S. LeBlanc of Dalhousie. Midget won the race in straight heats with plenty of speed in reserve. Time 2:41, 2:37 and 2:35. The free for all was called at four p. m. Violet R., winning the race, Lucy second money, Abbott W. third money and Speculation Jr. fourth money. There were some large bets placed last night between Lucy's followers and the backers of Abbott W. and Violet R., combined together that Lucy would not win the race and it would be that the way the driver, Abbott W. would take the grey mare at a killing pace for the first half and then let the Bathurst mare beat her home that the Bathurst mare and Abbott W. were out to trim the grey mare. CANADIAN CARGOES.

Steamers Sailing From St. John are Full Up.

ST. JOHN, Tuesday. — C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain from Liverpool took away Canadian goods valued at \$159,662 and foreign goods valued at \$25,994, making a total of \$185,657. C. P. R. liner Montclair for Bristol and Liverpool took away Canadian goods valued at \$23,953 and foreign goods valued at \$113,980, making a total of \$137,933.

PULP MILL IS NOW RUNNING BY WATER POWER IN THE WEST

It is the Big Mill of the Canadian Pacific Sulphite Pulp Co'y

INTERESTING INTERVIEW

(Special to the Morning Graphic.)

VANCOUVER, Tuesday.—The big saw mill of the Canadian Pacific Sulphite Pulp and Paper Company at Swanson Bay is now running by water power. E. J. Coyle, assistant general passenger agent of the C. P. R., who returned yesterday from a northern trip, stated that the water power was turned on at the mill while the steamer Amur was lying at Swanson Bay on her way south. "This company is proceeding steadily with the construction of its plant at Swanson Bay," said Mr. Coyle, "and it would be quite a revelation to many Vancouver people to see the enormous amount of work already completed. It will be the fall of this year before pulp making is in progress, according to the expectations of J. M. Mackinnon, manager of the company."

During his trip Mr. Coyle visited the Queen Charlotte Islands, and found considerable activity in mining there. The copper deposits are attracting a great deal of attention, and some considerable development work is being carried out on a number of claims. The valuable timber and coal lands of the island are also coming to the fore share of attention, and the outlook is that the islands will be the scene of great activity during the coming months.

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HAZEN'S CABINET WAS SWORN IN YESTERDAY.

FREDERICTON, Tuesday. — The new government was sworn in this afternoon at the Council chamber, the clerk of the executive administering the oath in the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor. In the Council chamber were also present Chamberlain Jones and Dr. Cox of the University, Supt. Inch and members of the council. The chamber was prettily decorated with carnations and roses and at the conclusion of the ceremony the Governor congratulated each member of the new administration in the heartiest manner, expressing the hope that the kindest relations would continue to exist as no doubt they would among all.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Governor accompanied by his private secretary retired and the new administration immediately got down to work. Hon. Mr. Maxwell was appointed president of the council. The date of elections for the new cabinet ministers was fixed, nomination April 7th, polling April 14th. Routine business was the next thing up and the administration sat in session until 11 o'clock this evening.
