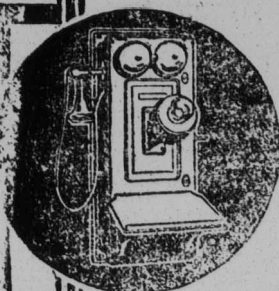

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ADJOURNED MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Officers Appointed For the Year.—Salaries of Wm. Hogan and Charles Edmunds Increased.—Ald. Stuart to Move For New Valuation.

Newcastle Town Council met in adjourned session Thursday night, Mayor Belyea presiding. Aldermen present—John Clark, D. P. Dyle, Jas. Falconer, A. H. Mackay, S. W. Miller, Dr. F. C. McGrath, Chas. Sargeant and H. H. Stuart.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

Communications were read from the Editor of The Canadian Municipal Journal re subscriptions to that organ; from the Sir George-Edmond Cartier Centenary Committee asking a contribution for the proposed celebration in memory of that statesman to be held in 1914.

The first was ordered filed. Re the second, Ald. Miller, seconded by Ald. Falconer, moved that a committee be appointed to solicit subscriptions for the proposed celebration. It was moved by Ald. Dyle and Mr. Stuart in amendment, and carried that the committee be appointed.

Ald. Miller moved, seconded by Ald. Mackay, that the report of the Committee be accepted.

Ald. Clark would like to see the appointment of Police and Scott Act Inspectors made separately.

Ald. Miller claimed that officer Hill had ever acted as Scott Act Inspector.

Ald. Falconer said he had thought about officer Hill but he had since heard that Mr. Hill had done Scott Act Work.

Ald. Sargeant said he knew of Mr. Hill doing Scott Act work.

Ald. Dyle testified to the same effect.

Ald. Mackay favored Mr. Hill's appointment.

Motion carried.

Scott Act Inspector: Dickson reported six Scott Act cases, for March, resulting in 3 convictions and 3 dismissals; and for April, 4 cases—2 convictions and 2 pending.

Ald. Stuart gave notice that at the next regular meeting of the Council he would move a resolution in favor of taking steps to have a new valuation made of the real estate, personal property and income of the Town.

On motion of Ald. Doyle and Miller salaries of Police and Scott Act Inspectors were fixed at \$2 per day.

On motion Ald. McGrath and Doyle, it was resolved to pay each officer at the rate of \$230 a year as Policeman and \$300 a year as Inspector.

The claim of John Russell & Co., against town for top wharage, already paid by the Town to the Newcastle Steamship Co., was referred to the Finance Committee.

On motion of Ald. Clark and Doyle, the salary of Charles Edmunds, former at the Police, was raised from \$175 to \$190 a year, from May 1.

On motion of Ald. Doyle and Miller, salary of Wm. Hogan, Town Treasurer, was raised from \$40 to \$50 a month, from May 1.

The motion of Ald. Falconer and Miller, to provide new uniforms for Police and Scott Act Inspectors, was deferred out of order, as the Police Committee had power to deal with the matter already.

Adjourned.

Wild Oats and False Wild Oats

According to a bulletin recently issued by the Seed Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, there is a type of more or less harmless Wild Oat that is frequently confused with the true Wild Oat which is recognized as being one of the worst of weeds. This publication, prepared by Mr. Norman Giddie, describes field experiments with these two plants and explains by means of charts and descriptive matter their distinguishing characteristics. According to this authority, it is a comparatively simple matter to distinguish the two sorts in the growing stage as the false variety shows the same manner of growth as the cultivated oat while the true Wild Oat exhibits a different habit. In the seed form, the difficulty of telling them apart is greater more especially in so far as some of the smaller varieties of the False Wild Oats are concerned. With the larger sorts, the difficulty of distinguishing them is more easy as an experienced eye will at once detect the False Wild Oat by its larger size and its usual close resemblance to the cultivated variety in which it is found. Generally speaking, too, the outer seed coat is more open in front with cultivated forms and False Wild Oats so that the inner coat is broadly visible, whereas in Wild Oats, the edges of the outer coat almost meet. Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made in any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duration: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing in type-upte a quarter section alongside his homestead.

Duration: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years' from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn (homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres of land.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, cannot obtain a pre-emption entry for a purchased homestead in certain districts.

Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
