First he was stripped quite naked, then fariously beaten with bamboos. One fiend in human form then drove a bamboo through the Bishop's body, whilst two others plucked out both eyes. Although he had fainted, the excess of pain was so great that the unfortunate victim came for a short time to his senses and feebly endeavored to drag from his body the bamboo which was cruelly lacerating his entrails. No sooner was this observed than, with jeers and cries of mockery, they seized s stouter bamboo and thrust it in such a manner right through the quivering form of the victim that the upper end of it was driven into his throat. The prelate's terrible agony lasted for three long hours before he expired. His companion, Father Joseph, lived only two hours.
