Hant's Harbor—Improvement; 2 to 3 quintals in traps; caplin plentiful. Heart's Content—No fish; no caplin. Trinity—Little fish on hook and line; no caplin. Western Bay—Traps two and three qts.; plenty caplin. Bay de Verde—Traps in Bacalleu Tickle doing well; trawls 1/2 to 1 qts.; others nothing. Old Pelican—Caplin plentiful; good sign of codfish. Bay Roberts—No fish; caplin scarce. Harbor Grace—Plenty caplin; traps 1/2 to 3 qts.; line 1/4 qt. South Island—Fish nil; few caplin, herring and salmon. Burin—Plenty caplin; trawls 1 to 3 qts.; one trap 4 qts.; dories 1 to 2 qts. Lamaline—Few traps 5 to 10 qts.; trawls poor. Fortune—Trawls 1/2 to 1 qt.; plenty caplin. St. Lawrence—Fish scarce in traps and trawls; plenty caplin. Port aux Basques—Boats 4 to 6 qts. Lark Harbor—Fair fishery. Curling—Salmon scarce.

The weather the first of the week was dreadful, men were scarcely able to get their traps but in the last few days it has changed, and with the smooth sea it was possible for the traps to be hauled. When the weather got better there was a great sign of fish. Below I append the latest reports from some of the Cape St. Mary's fleet: P. Power, Argenta, 100 qts.; St. Murphy and J. Davis near the 200 mark; R. Wyse, 130; J. Wyse, 100; F. Barron, 100; W. Miller, 125; others from 20 to 150 qts. This is great news; it creates a fine stir in the people. A good fishery is what is now needed, for with the high cost of living a failure in the fishery would cause starvation among many who have no other way of earning their daily bread.

To Join the Arctic.

William Doyle, son of Capt. T. Doyle left by the express for Quebec last evening to join Capt. Bernier's ship Arctic for a two years voyage in the Arctic regions in the vicinity of Melville Sound, where Captain Bernier will survey the territory for the Canadian Government. Young Doyle was with Capt. Bernier on his last trip to the North when they spent 20 months cruising between the 78th and 82nd parallels. Although not yet 20 years of age till next October, Doyle has not only made the voyage to the Arctic regions but has been twelve voyages across the Atlantic. Captain Bernier entertains a warm regard for him.

Successful Operation.

At 12.45 p.m. yesterday the surgeons at the General Hospital performed an operation on the lad, Cyril Ford, who was accidentally shot on the South Side, Monday afternoon. Objects of Natural History Society.

At a meeting of committee appointed to draw up constitution for the Natural History Society it was resolved to recommend the following as the objects of the Society:— (a) To promote the study of Natural Science in Newfoundland, especially in respect of the indigenous Fauna and Flora, the Geology and Physical Geography of the Island and its dependencies; (b) To create a more general interest in Nature Studies, especially among the youth of the Island, and to impress upon the Educational Authorities and the community the expediency of making these studies a more prominent factor in the Educational system of the Colony; (c) To encourage observation and research in matters of Natural History, and by means of stated meetings, excursions, lectures, and conferences, to collect the results of individual observation and research; (d) To keep a record of all its proceedings, transactions and researches, and, if found practicable, to publish in permanent form from time to time the Report of its transactions; (e) To confer with similar Societies elsewhere upon matters of natural interest and concern; (f) To organize and establish upon a scientific basis a Museum of Natural History, either as the independent work of the Society, or associated with the Public Museum upon such terms and conditions as may be arranged between the Society and the Executive Government.

Excursion to Brigus.

The Shamrock Amusement Club have decided to hold an excursion to Brigus on the general holiday, July 13th, and are now selling tickets at a very small fare. A new feature about this excursion is that the train leaves here on the eve of the holiday, and on arriving at Brigus a sociable will be held. This is a splendid arrangement, as the excursionists will have the whole day to go around Brigus, and also have time to take a rest, and they arrive in St. John's the night before work all the tiresome effects will not be felt. A large number have already engaged tickets, and this excursion will, no doubt, be a big success.
