## League Football. Inter-Brigade.

**Cadets Beat Highlanders 3 to 0.**

There was quite an enthusiastic audience at St. George's Field, last evening to witness the football match between the C. C. C. and Highlanders. There was a strong breeze blowing down the arena and splendid weather prevailed. Winning the toss the Blited laddies played from the western goal with the wind in their favor for the first half. The teams lined up:

C. C. C.—R. Walsh, goal; J. Hynes, J. Walsh, backs; J. Murphy, W. Hart, J. Byrne, halves; M. Cault, T. Rodgers, C. Murphy, E. Rawlins, R. Jackman, forwards.

Highlanders—H. Mitchell, goal; E. Coffin, H. Smith, backs; F. Searle, G. Benson, T. Ledingham, halves; J. McKinley, S. Robertson, W. Rennie, E. Robertson, W. Auchinleck, forwards.

From the start both teams settled down to hard work and the Highlanders worked the leather down on Cadet ground, but their shooting was off, and when the ball was sent towards the net Walsh in goal saved

brilliantly, so that it was a hard proposition to score. The C. C. C. now dashed west, gave a nice exhibition of fast play and Hart at centre half played a rattling good game for the Cadets all through. He succeeded in getting the ball up against the wind, was knocked down a couple of times by charging opponents, but held the leather and passing it to Rawlins he sent a drop shot from about two-thirds of the field and it went true to the mark, beating Mitchell and scoring No. 1 for the boys in red and blue. Hands were now given twice against the Cadets, corners were secured from them, but nothing resulted, and Benson for the Highlanders sent a hot shot which Walsh brilliantly cleared. Both teams now had trials for goal but failed to score, and the half time whistle blew, the teams crossing—C.C.C. 1 goal; Highlanders, 0.

The ball being reentered the Cadets immediately pushed down field, when Cault took the ball along the right wing, passed to Murphy who sent it to Jackman, and he shot No. 2 into the net for the Cadets. The Highlanders now put on a fast pace and shot repeatedly for goal against the wind, but Walsh guarded his position well. Some fouls were now recorded against the Cadets, who soon again got control of the leather; Hart sent it across to Rodgers who shot from the inside left and hit up the third goal for the Cadets. The Cadets bombarded their opponents' goal but they defended well. No further scoring was done and the final solo sounded with C.C.C. 3 goals; Highlanders, nil. Mr. W. J. Higgins refereed.

## Enoch Arden in Real Life.

London, July 9.—A real version of "Enoch Arden" has just been enacted at Preston.

In February last the body of a man was found floating in the river. From certain marks on the arm a woman identified the body as that of her husband, whom she had not seen for nine years. After the inquest the coroner granted the necessary certificates and the woman drew the insurance money. Since then she has married again and was living happily until a few days ago, when her real husband suddenly returned. It appears that he has been living in Wales and has not been in Preston for a considerable period.

Much sympathy is expressed for the woman in her unfortunate position. When the original husband returned the second "husband" left her. "We have been so happy together, and I hope he comes back to me," she declared tearfully.
