## Daily News Shows the Premier is Simply Not in It.

It is not correct, as the Daily News asserts, that answers have been furnished to our inquiries on behalf of the public, and that yesterday we asked for more. Even if we did, is there anything wrong in that? Does the Government refuse information to the public? Does the Daily News think people are going to be put off with such information as it supplied last Thursday and Monday? Does the Premier imagine that people will be satisfied with the financial dope he administered at Burin on the 11th of last month. On Thursday we asked for an itemized statement of what has been spent in connection with the Bonavista Branch, and that we asked for further information. But we shall ask, and shall continue to ask questions, and the public can draw their conclusions as to the questions and answers. We are perfectly justified in putting the questions, as the Premier published in the Daily News information which is grossly inaccurate.

At the Burin Agricultural Exhibition he referred to the opening of the Bonavista Branch, said the Trepassy Branch would be opened within a year; as would the Heart's Content Branch, and that there would also be some actioned the Bay de Verde Branch and the Bonne Bay Branch, and the latter would tap practically all the principal settlements in the Burin District, and then indicated that all these branches would be out of the loan he obtained in 1910.

On this matter curiously there is a direct conflict of testimony between the Editor of the Daily News and the Premier. The Premier stated that all the work will be done out of the 1910 loan. That loan realized about Three and three quarter million dollars in cash. The Daily News yesterday stated that certain branch lines would cost \$5,250,000, even at \$15,000 a mile, and excluding the long line along the peninsula, from Terra Nova to the west end, and around the foot to Grand Bank and Fortune. Moreover, the Premier promised, we understand, a great deep water pier which would cost a million or so, for the terminus of the Burin Branch, at which great steamers could be berthed.

The Daily News estimate, however, exceeds for part of the Premier's

programme the Premier's estimate for the whole by \$1,500,000 in cash. And the Daily News estimate is obviously an under-estimate, since nothing is allowed for stations, wharves, piers and other extras, and for the purchase of rights of way, arbitrations, &c. Yesterday we dealt with this phase of the financial obligation as best we could, with the paucity of information which the Government has designed to vouchsafe, and estimated that \$20,000 a mile would be the average cost of the Bonavista Branch by the time it was absolutely completed. This estimate is not denied by the Daily News, nor are particulars furnished by which it can be shown to be either too great or too low an estimate.

At this rate we showed that the Bonavista Branch and the Trepassy Branch would cost at least as much as the 1910 loan realized; and further, that the cost of the 350 miles of the News would be \$7,000,000 in cash, or \$7,500,000 in bonds. The Daily News is thus considerably out and the Premier is simply not in it at all, either on our estimate or that of the Daily News. The Premier will have to float another loan of some 6 or 7 millions for railways and a million for his deep water pier.

## To-Day's News.

SHANGHAI, To-day. Rumors were current last night that Admiral Sui's fleet at Hankow, had either surrendered or been overcome by the revolutionists.

LONDON, To-day.

If Russia enforces ultimatum to Persia by occupying part of North Britain will likely take a similar step in the south. Russian troops are reinforced in the north and two regiments of British troops have been landed at Bushire.

PEKING, To-day.

The Government continues gathering the Manchus recruits at Peking, but will soon be unable to make payments. It is not believed here that the Chinese can mobilize a large enough army about Peking to venture on an attack, but the Government's inability to collect revenue for a single provincial capital is almost certain sooner or later to bring about a capitalization.

## Collecting Money.

The following notice was read at all the Masses last Sunday by order of His Grace the Archbishop.

**NOTICE.**—It has come to the notice of His Grace the Archbishop that several parties are patrolling the town soliciting money nominally for various religious and charitable purposes. These persons have no authority to make such collections, and besides incurring the censure of the Church, they are also placing themselves within the power of the Civil Law and may be arrested for obtaining money under false pretences. We advise all persons who may be asked for subscriptions in future for such purposes to make sure that the persons asking for money are duly authorized to collect. Any person so authorized must be able to show a written permission, signed by either Monsignor Rosche, Administrator of the Cathedral, or Rev. Fr. McDermott of St. Patrick's, or Rev. Fr. Kitchen, St. Joseph's. All others soliciting should be refused and their names reported to the Clergy.

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## Newfoundlander Killed

Edward Puddister, of 21A Summer St., Dorchester, employed as a line-man for the Fred T. Ley Construction Company, who fell from a pole at the end of Beeson Street and Gray Cliff Road last Wednesday afternoon, as the result of placing his hand on a live wire and falling to the ground, died early yesterday morning at the Newtown Hospital. At the time of the accident a call was sent in for the police ambulance, but on its arrival the injured man was taken to the hospital in a passing automobile in a very weak condition.

The young man alluded to above was a resident of St. John's East for many years and has relatives living in St. John's still. He had been away from here 23 years and only last summer his brother visited his friends here. The death occurred quite recently.

## Stole Beef and Socks.

Saturday last a young man who was under the influence of liquor in coming down Signal Hill Road stole a piece of beef weighing 23 lbs., valued at \$4.75, from the hook outside of the shop of Mr. Geo. Summers, butcher. Walking further down he broke open the door of Mr. N. Sparks' shop and ordered Sparks to cook the beef for him. Sparks refused, when the man threatened to assault him, and he (Sparks) then went into the cellar and getting out through a window called the police who arrested the other. While in the house the man stole a pair of socks but left this and the beef behind when he was arrested. To-day he was before the court, pleaded that he was drunk and did not know what he was doing, but was fined \$20 or 30 days for his escapade.
