## The Dredge Picnickers.

The dredge picnickers must now be well on their way to the other side of the Atlantic, but the curiosity of the people about the row which took place when Mr. Piccott discovered he had been ignored as a claimant for another political picnic has not yet abated. It would appear that Mr. Piccott knew nothing of the finalization of the arrangements for the picnic until he returned from his Christmas visit to his friends in Bay Roberts, and that the Government had no intention of sending him across the ocean on the "dredge" business. Then Mr. Piccott butted in, demanded as Minister of the Department that the matter should be placed in his hands, threatened that he would resign if his demands were not complied with, and succeeded in upsetting the whole arrangement. Mr. Piccott won out, and is now nearing his destination on the other side. This is the fourth occasion on which we have made mention of these matters, but the Government has maintained the strictest silence.

## More Diphtheria. Threw Away the Loaf.

Annie, eldest daughter of Mr. Chas. McCarthy, has developed diphtheria at her parents' residence on Newtown Road. Dr. Macpherson diagnosed the case yesterday morning. The family consists of nine children, the latest addition only arriving on Friday last. Owing to the recent snow drifts the suffering member is compelled to remain at home. We think that the Government and Council should immediately have the road cleared so the ambulance could proceed there and have the afflicted child removed to Hospital. Yesterday Inspector O'Brien visited the house and drove out in a sleigh, but the horse could not get further than the Shamrock cricket grounds and the Inspector had to proceed to the house as best he could on foot. The other children in the house have been isolated and protective injections of anti-toxin will be given them to-day. An effort should be made immediately by the proper authorities, Municipal or State, to get the road shoveled so that the girl may be conveyed to hospital, not alone as a means of affording her the best possible treatment with a view to preserving her life, but also to prevent the spread of the disease amongst the other little ones in the house, whose lives, she remains in the house, will also be jeopardized. We shall watch closely what action will be taken in this important matter.

## Two Boys Drowned in River

Arthur Boutiller and D. J. McAulay Skated Into Open Water.

After several hours dragging the upper reaches of the Sydney River this morning, D. R. Nicholson and Blowers Andrews recovered the bodies of Arthur Boutiller, aged 14 years, and D. J. McAulay, 17.

The boys had gone skating last night about 7 o'clock, and in the darkness fell into an open channel, and lost their lives. The spot where the lads were drowned is that open space the city side of Chappell's log boom, where the old stumps of trees stick up from the water. This is a dangerous spot and seldom freezes over until late in the year.

The boys were missed from their homes last night, but little searching was done for them.

## The River is Draggd.

This morning at daylight a number of people scoured the countryside asking for news of the missing lads, but none was to be had.

Messrs. Nicholson and Andrews secured a canoe and an axe and chopped their way through the ice to the open water where, after considerable dragging, they located a stocking cap sticking up through the ice. Shortly afterwards they found the bodies of the victims in about 11 feet of water.

By the time the bodies were landed practically every resident of the countryside had come down to the shore.

Both the victims lived at Coxhead with their parents. Arthur Boutiller was a son of John Henry Boutiller, and young McAulay son of Daniel McAulay.—Sydney Post, Jan. 4.
