Skated Into Open Water.

After several hours dragging the pper reaches of the Sydney River this morning, D. R. Nicholson and Blowers Andrews recovered the bodies of Arthur Boutilier, aged 14 years, and D. J. McAulay, 17.

The boys had gone skating las night about 7 o'clock, and in the darkness fell into an open channel, and lost their lives. The spot where the lads were drowned is that open space the city side of Chappell's log boom where the old stumps of trees stick up from the water.
