Critical Moment
Early in Summer.

Mr. Hilaire Belloc lectured to a
large audience in the Free Trade
Hall, Manchester, recently, on the
progress and duration of the war.

"We are unable to tell what the
duration of the war may be," said Mr.
Belloc, "but these factors in the
problem make it certain that the late
spring or the early summer will be
the critical moment. By that time
the British contingent will be for the
most part equipped and in the field;
the ice-bound ports of Russia will be
free, and possibly the Dardanelles
will also be open. At the same time
the last batches of untrained men,
newly trained for the purpose, which
Germany and Austria can put in the
field will have appeared. And if you
cannot say which way the balance
will have inclined by the end of May,
or the beginning of June, you can at
least say with confidence that in that
critical moment will appear, not nec-
essarily a 'decision,' as the soldiers
call it, but those actions in the war
which will tell you the way it is go-
ing."

The plan of the enemy was to get
the Russians behind the Vistula, so
that a comparatively small force
would be sufficient to watch them,
and then to draft great reinforce-
ments to the west to break the line.
The way to do that was very simple,
but very difficult; it meant getting
hold of Warsaw. In the west our
game was fairly clear; it was simply
one of attrition. Neuve Chapelle and
other attacks were not really at-
tempts to break through the German
lines; they were simply attempts to
wear down the German lines. Other-
wise the situation in the west would
have no meaning, for, on the average,
we had not pushed the Germans back
by a yard since the middle of October.
What we gained in ground did not
matter besides the proportion of
men who were put out of action, and
this process of attrition had been in
favor of the Allies.

One of two things must happen,
unless by the capture of Warsaw the
Germans could bring great reinforce-
ments to the west; either their line
must break, which meant immediate
defeat, or, much more probable, they
would be compelled to shorten it,
which meant their falling back for
120 to 200 miles in face of very hard
pressure, with the chance of not be-
ing able to form the line again. "But
if the Germans get Warsaw," said
Mr. Belloc, "and bring great masses
of men to the west, the campaign will
go for them and not for us."

Mr. Belloc emphasized again the
great importance of Warsaw as the
centre of the railway lines which
would supply the Russian army in an
invasion of Germany. The capture
of Przemyśl had released perhaps
about 200,000 Russians, and when the
fine weather came it gave the Rus-
sians uninterrupted possession of
Galicia and freed them from trouble
with their communications. But,
Przemyśl was secondary to Warsaw.
If the Germans could get Warsaw it
would not matter much what hap-
pened in the Carpathians. He treated
the forcing of the Dardanelles as a
matter which was still not beyond
doubt. In the Narrows it would need
the indirect fire of our 15-inch guns
to effect it, and the accuracy of that
fire depended on the work of our air-
craft, which depended again on the
weather.
