

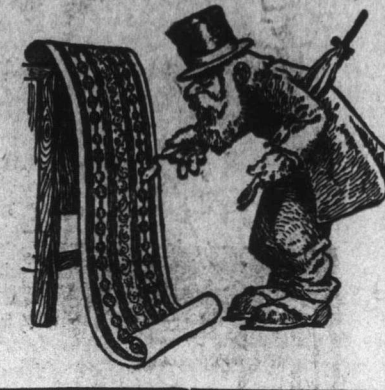

Among my friends is a woman who is very keen for the economic independence of woman and even carries her ideas so far as to speak scornfully of any clever woman who settles down to the cares of home and children as "wasting herself."

Now, I don't know about the individual women of whom she speaks. Perhaps they are wasting their brains by not making good. But any woman who does make good in the big job of creating and maintaining a home and rearing children, isn't wasting her brains.

Take some of the departments of a woman's job and see all that is involved in doing the thing well.

Some of the Requirements.

First and foremost, of course, is the rearing of the children. Think of the knowledge of hygiene and of child psychology that could well be used in helping them to have healthy minds in healthy bodies. Think then of the questions a mother is asked in the course of the day—if she educates her child by her answers instead of merely putting him off consider the thought and study involved (to say nothing of the patience).

She should be a Daniel Come to Judgment.

And then if she has several children, think of the judicial qualities she sorely needs. A mother enters a room, little sister is giving brother a push, he returns the push viciously and knocks her over. Apparently she only got what she deserved, and yet behind her push there may have been some offense on brother's part (and behind that, one on hers, etc., etc.). To deal fairly with the scores of such situations that arise in the course of the day, surely it needs a Daniel come to judgment. (Wouldn't you love to know how Portia managed the little Portias and Bassanios.)

I might go on with that subject and fill the page instead of just my column, and yet that is only one branch of a woman's job.

She is the buyer for the family. Think of the knowledge of values she

needs, to buy wisely. She is an interior decorator. To create an attractive interior on the small means of the average family, is a task to tax an artist. She feeds the family. To do this as well as it could be done would involve a thorough knowledge of dietetics, in addition to skill in the delicate art of appetizing cookery.

Also An Expert Accountant. She handles most of the family money. She should be a careful accountant, and should also join forces with her husband in making a wise budget.

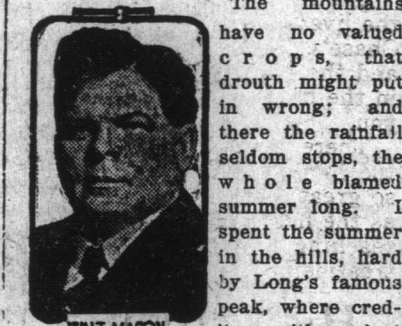

### A Workman's Error.

In order to discourage and even punish careless work on aircraft, the following case might well be applied to others: At Tottenham Police Court on August 1st, William Benjamin Smith, of Tottenham, and James Harding, of Enfield (both in England), were summoned by the Ministry of Munitions for committing certain acts likely to endanger any person using an airplane. They were also summoned for doing certain acts calculated to deceive their employers as to the quality of certain material. It was stated that the men were working on spars for Handley-Page machines, and Harding held a square while Smith drilled a hole in an airplane spar. The hole was a quarter of an inch out, and after discovering their error the defendants stuffed the hole with a plug, and made another hole in the right place. The effect was to reduce the strength of the spar. A government inspector who detected the mistake asked Smith if he would like to ride on a flying machine containing such a spar, and Smith replied that he would not. Mr. Rowland Chessum, the proprietor of the factory, said he had repeatedly impressed on his workers the need of exactitude. When he was informed of the incident he called the work people together and again reminded them of the importance of their work. He also dismissed Smith and Harding. The defendants were fined. Now the moral of this story is that the work-

men in aircraft factories hold the lives of many airmen in their hands, and under no circumstances should they allow faulty work to pass on. If they do, then they are guilty of a very serious crime.—Scientific American.
