

### at the City Council.

The Municipal Council held its weekly meeting last evening. Mayor presided and Councillors Messrs. Brownrigg, Malloy and Tait were present. After reading the minutes the following business was discussed:  
Barter, President Truckmen's Association called attention of the Council to the pay of carmen from November 1st, which is \$8.00 per day. The Mayor was read from C. R. Brownrigg in connection with the lay-off of Sundry property, plan of which has been approved, and in question of the cost of making roads and also the cost of laying out sewerage for which the Mayor has all the property will not be sold out immediately and arrangements may be made for one street at a time.  
The N.M. Industrial Workers' Association, through their Secretary, called attention to the fact that the Mayor had signed P. F. Moore, who appeared in the Royal Gazette the right to use the waters of the Dove River in the district of St. John's for the purpose of driving machinery. The Association wanted to know if it is the wish of the Council to reserve these waters, they being already memorialized the Executive Government with reference to the Water Power. They offered to give the Council in this matter if necessary the Mayor be authorized to call a public meeting to take up the matter.  
Applications were received from A. Brownrigg to right to install motor, on Emma Hill to repair houses, on North Street, and Hung Shing to permit to extend porch rear of house, Monkstown Road, and from James Cummings to approve plans for building on Pleasant Street. The Mayor was approved; the two cases to be reported into.  
The City Engineer's report dealt with the question of repairing blow-out and laying of the sewer on Fort Street.  
The Health Officer's report and the

Plumbing Inspector's were also read. A requisition for uniforms for the Inspectors was accepted to.  
After disposing of some other routine business and passing of the pay rolls and Bills the meeting adjourned.

### Nfld Scotch Cured Herring.

There has been relatively little activity in the market for Newfoundland Scotch cured herring since last reports, although some minor sales have been reported. As a result of this inactivity prices have weakened to some extent and it is now understood that sales are being made at the range between \$24 to \$27 per barrel, according to quality. As supplies are not by any means liberal, it may be expected that before new fall caught herring come into market the present holdings of winter and spring herring will be entirely exhausted. The New York market has probably received its full supply of herring from this source for the present season, and the demand will have to be met out of spot stocks. As there has been comparatively little movement in Newfoundland herring during the present month, merchants and importers have evidenced a weakness which reflects itself in the prices. Those who were holding at \$27 per barrel appear to be content to take \$25, and it is possible that some would be willing to sell at \$24 for fish which have been held much higher. The consumption of Scotch cured herring in the Metropolitan district has been curtailed, in the opinion of the trade, by the continued warm weather, but once the demand is resumed importers are of the belief that stocks here will be quickly cleaned up.--N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Nov. 2.

### The Epidemic.

Two patients were admitted to Grenfell Hall Hospital yesterday: Jas. Murphy, Signal Hill Road, and a small girl named Mitchell, whose father, mother, and two sisters were admitted yesterday. Two were discharged, and several removed to the convalescent ward.  
A message from Dr. Green, of Bonne Bay, to Dr. Fraser, stated 100 cases had developed there and two deaths had occurred. Dr. Green, who has been ill, is now able to work and needs no further help, but deplors the lack of mail and freight, which would contain many needed articles.  
Dr. Cron wired from Hr. Grace yesterday that 21 cases had appeared there last week.  
Another message stated that there were 105 persons ill and one death at Broad Cove, Bay de Verde. According to messages to Magistrate Fitzgerald, there was one death at Gambo on Tuesday, and three other patients were seriously ill, but otherwise the conditions were normal. Dr. Smith visited Glenwood on Monday and treated the sufferers, afterwards proceeding to Badger Brook and Millertown, where he found conditions improving, though a large number of persons are yet ill. For the week ending yesterday, Nov. 14th, 1,749 cases had been reported from the various districts, with 60 deaths.

### The Soldiers Banquet.

More than 1,000, comprised of Blue Puttees and men-in-training, attended last night's supper given by the Government. Revs. (Capt.) Clayton, Dr. Curtis and Dr. Carter, and members of the Legislature, were also present. A repeat partaken of, Sir M. P. Cashin, Minister of Finance, and Hon. J. R. Bennett, Minister of MUNIC, delivered speeches, after which an impromptu concert was held. Excellent musical selections were rendered by the C.L.E. and C.E.C. Bands, and by the time the celebration ended everyone had thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

### West Coast Notes.

(Western Star.)  
Caribou have been very scarce of late.  
It is stated that Bishop White will pay his first official visit to this coast next year.  
A Port aux Choix man was badly gored by a bull recently. One of the animal's horns was driven into his leg.  
Among a recent list of recipients of the Distinguished Conduct Medal was the name of Pte. James O'Quinn. Evidently this refers to James O'Quinn, of South Branch.  
There are many indications that moose are becoming very plentiful, and numerous signs of the animals have been seen this fall at numerous places from Seal Island on Lower Humber to way beyond Eddy's Lake.  
Up to Saturday night there had been fourteen deaths from the influenza epidemic between Deer Lake and Spruce Brook, not including those at Lark Hr., and since several more deaths have been reported.  
The coal at Bogonia Seam, South Branch, now shows a width of 22 feet, and still going strong. The great drawback is the lack of men for operations. It is proposed to construct a line of railway from the trunk line to the workings.



### The Epidemic Abroad.

Almost unbelievable conditions exist at Moose Jaw, Sask., and vicinity, as the result of the Spanish influenza epidemic. Eight persons working with a threshing outfit were found dead, no medical help being near. These occurred in the farming section. In one house in Moose Jaw the parents of two children were discovered dead, the little ones playing about the corpses. Just outside the town in another house, the relief committee found the body of a man, who had been dead three days, with the wife lying beside the corpse of her husband unable to move. Other cases of a similarly pathetic nature have been located. There is no help to be had for love or money and those afflicted



### Health Report.

During the week 5 cases of diphtheria were reported in the city and five residences were disinfected and released from quarantine. At present in hospital are 21 diphtheria, 3 scarlet fever, 4 small pox, and one influenza patients, while being treated at home are one case of diphtheria and one of typhoid. Fifty-four influenza cases are being treated at the Grenfell Hall hospital.

### Circuit Court.
