New Glasgow's Plan.

For Dealing With Unemployment.

NEW GLASGOW, April 12.—The large Town Council chamber in New Glasgow was crowded this evening by an audience of representative citizens gathered to discuss the question of the unemployed and to fortify against any acute situation that might arise. Mayor Mason presided, and set the ball rolling by stating the policy of every man being his brother's keeper, and it must not be said that any person in New Glasgow was in want or even felt any suffering for the necessities of life. The time was at hand when the better off citizens must go down in their pockets, or at least pledge themselves financially in support of their less fortunate neighbors.

He had Miss Murray, visitor for the Social Service, present the situation and give a forecast of what the needs might be in a month or so, if general industrial conditions did not improve. While this statement did not show an exceedingly serious situation as yet, the Social Service Council only being called on to render help to about forty families in the town, it was felt to be sufficiently serious to warrant action being taken.

A great many speakers took part in the discussion that followed and many different proposals for a solution were submitted. Some favored borrowing a large sum of money by a public vote, sanctioned by special legislation; others suggested a plan patterned after the Patriotic Fund, giving to needy families a certain sum per week. Another that the better off families should agree each to look after a needy family and make it a household obligation to supply the family of temporary adoption just as they did their own.

It was the Mayor who supplied the suggestion finally adopted. He contended that what the families needed was work, not hand-out charity. Give them work at a living wage of a dollar or dollar and a half a day, or just what was sufficient until conditions improved. The money for this work, say twenty or twenty-five thousand, to be raised by popular subscription and paid into the town treasury. The town Council would undertake work, such as on streets and parks, and see that the money was expended in a manner to leave a fitting monument to the undertaking.

On motion of Mr. P. A. MacGregor, and seconded by Mr. D. W. Macdonald, the plan was unanimously adopted. A committee of citizens, consisting of Robert Murray (chairman), H. T. Sutherland, D. W. Macdonald, A. M. Douglas, and A. J. Chisholm, was appointed to canvass the town.

The scene which followed was unlike an auction sale, and in a trice three thousand dollars was in the hands of the Town Treasurer or pledged to the work, the subscriptions being in the hundreds. Several pledged a sum monthly while there was need.

The rate of wages to be paid will depend upon the size and requirements of the bread-winner's family. Several expressed doubt as to men working for one dollar or one-fifty, but the Mayor declared this was to provide bread and supply the table wants; it was not calculated to supply luxuries or amusements. The money was given freely from the pockets of people who saved of their earnings, and it will be administered truly and honestly to relieve suffering and want.
