**"Becky" Wells, the
Madcap Actress.**

During the reign of George III. London was shaking its sides with laughter over the drolleries of a merry actress, called "Becky" Wells. Old and young were delighted with her in the role of Beck Chadwallader in Foote's "Author" or Cowslip in the "Agreeable Surprise." She had a wonderful range of gifts, and there never was a Juliet more alluring, or a Jane Shore more pathetic. Her Romeo, however, was not content with making love to her on the stage, but carried her off to the altar. Soon afterwards, he eloped with one of her bridesmaids. Becky was not the one to spoil her eyes by weeping for a faithless husband, and linked her fortunes to those of Captain Topham, of the Life Guards, who, tiring of her, began to flirt outrageously. She fancied that the king himself looked upon her with eyes of admiration, and she followed his majesty like a shadow, hiring a yacht to give him chase on the seas. Whenever the king looked around, there was the barque of Becky in pursuit of him, the infatuated woman reclining on the deck in all the languor and sumptuousness of a Cleopatra. But the king was not to be lured and, when at last Becky's extravagances landed her in the debtors' prison, Captain Topham sent his friend Reynolds to release her. To her husband's joy she eloped with Reynolds. She was next seen on the Norfolk Coast, enjoying the respect and homage of the justices by proclaiming herself Queen Marie Antoinette. Then to Fleet Street prison she was again taken for debt, and here met a rich young Jew, whom she married, despite the fact that her husband, Captain Topham, was still living. The nuptial revels cost the Jew £500. Becky still pursued her extravagant manner of living and eventually fell on evil days. She sank lower and lower, and finally, on November 12, 1804, there passed away the merry-hearted little madcap who had once bewitched London with her beauty and drolleries.

**The Old "Pretenders"
Cause Frustrated.**

During the reign of George I., when, in defiance of the Treaty of Utrecht, James the Pretender was in France, busily engaged in preparing for a descent on Scotland with the help of Louis XIV., the latter unfortunately died. This was a fatal blow to the prospects of the Pretender, for it was evident that the French Government would have enough to do in repairing the shattered resources of their own country. But it was too late to draw back, and within a few days after the death of Louis the flame of rebellion was actually kindled, both in Scotland and England. The Earl of Mar had gathered 10,000 clansmen around him at Braemar, a village 52 miles southwest of Aberdeen, and held all the highlands for James; while the Duke of Argyll, with a royalist army strongly posted at Stirling, watched all his movements. The Jacobites of Northumberland had been called to arms by the Earl of Derwentwater and Mr. Forster, the member for the country; but few of them had obeyed the summons. They were aided by 1,800 Highlanders, a reinforcement from Mar, and were joined by a few lords of the Scottish Border. But the royalist troops, forcing Forster into the town of Preston, in Lancashire, there compelled him to surrender. On the same day, Nov. 13, 1745, at Sheriffmuir, in Perthshire, the Duke of Argyll inflicted, not an absolute defeat, but a severe check upon Mar, who, after the engagement retreated hastily to Dunkirk, and shortly after landed at Peterhead, but finding no possibility of enforcing his claims, he re-embarked at Montrose, landed at Gravesend, in France, and ultimately died at Rome in 1746.

**Plan to Open
European Bank.**

Frank Vanderlip, former President of the National City Bank in the United States, is offering 14 nations a plan for formation of a gold reserve bank of the United States of Europe. He offered the plan to Poland last week and will offer it to Wirth this week. The plan involves one billion dollars in gold, which, Vanderlip believes, would be subscribed largely in the United States. The plan which is offered Poland, Germany and others, summarized, is: A bank similar to the Federal Reserve; one billion gold capital; a note issue at five billions uniform in character throughout all countries. Provisions against any attempt of the holders of paper to obtain gold cash; nine governors, five in the United States should the United States subscribe for the bulk of the shares; the bank to enjoy extra territorial rights similar to embassies; provisions against hampering legislation in each subscribing country; a detailed plan for discounting commercial paper and the distribution of bank profits; eight per cent. dividends for shareholders.
