EXPEDITION TO EAST AFRICA.—We are glad to be able to announce that the Government has resolved to send out Mr. Angelo, the distinguished African traveller, to the Somali country, to inquire into the alleged existence of British captiyes there, and provided with means with which, if possible, to effect their liberation. Mr. Angelo, as we have stated, is better acquainted with this part of Eastern Africa than any man living. He is confident of meeting with a good reception from the chieftains of a tribe which he represents as more humane and more civilized than the majority of the natives of this part of Africa. He is to go out as the paid agent of the Government; but we understand that it is not yet decided whether or no he is to be accredited in an official capacity. We can well believe that Sir Stafford Northcote and his colleagues hesitate to incur a risk which may involve the necessity of another expedition like that of Abyssinia. Mr. Angelo, however, is willing to bear the whole responsibility, so far as his own personal safety is concerned. We must give him much credit for this resolution, and for his first spontaneous offer of unpaid service. Every Englishman must wish him success in his mission. We are much pleased to hear from an esteemed correspondent, who has interested himself throughout in the fate of our fellow-countrymen, the survivors of the crew of the St. Abbs, who drifted on this coast with their ship thirteen years ago, that the full ventualition for he matter in the columns of this journal, during several weeks past, is considered to have done much in directing public attention to their unhappy case.—London Standard.

Liquor Legislature at its present session was, to repeal the then existing prohibitory liquor-law, which was involved in the "State Constabulary Act." Their action was veto-d by the Governor, but last Thursday the repealing bill was passed over the veto by a vote of 152 to 63. As a substitute for the prohibitory law, a License bill has been introduced, which contains no restrictions except public convenience as to the number of licenses that may be issued, or the parties taking them out. Licenses are to be granted by county-commissioners, who are to be elected by the people. One clause gives the inhabitants of any town or city the right to vote in January or February, that no licenses shall be granted in that city or town. Another clause prohibits sales to any intoxicated person or any person under 21 years of age.

THE CANADIAN ROUTE TO THE PACIFIC.—The London Times of the 6th informs us that the proposed new route by land and water from Canada to the Pacific was attracting some attention on 'Change and among capitalists. As our readers.

As our readers are probably aware, the suggestion is that it should start from Collingwood, or Georgian Bay, and consist of river and lake navigation for about 2,400 miles out of the entire 3,200 to Vancouver's Island. The Times remarks:—"The Canadian Government, it is said, have agreed to open the portion between Lake Superior and Fort Garry, a distance of about 500 miles, of which 300 are navigable, and the Government of British Columbia are expected by grants of land to facilitate the work through their territory. It is affirmed that the expense would be comparatively light, and that the undertaking might be completed in less than two years, when passengers would be able to make the transit in about eighteen days. Mr. Alfred Waddington, of Victoria, Vancouver Island, has been the most prominent advocate of the enterprise, and is to describe its features in detail, especially as regards the pass by the Rocky Mountains, at the Geographical Society on Monday."
