

WELSH AN EASY VICTOR  
OVER REDMONDHead and Footwork Were Very  
Good and Seemed Stronger  
in Bout in Winnipeg

Winnipeg, Man., May 16.—Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion of England, and challenger for the world's championship, easily and in a decisive fashion scored a victory over Jack Redmond, of St. Paul, in a twelve-round bout here tonight.

In the opening round Redmond showed up fairly well, though mastered from the first. The second saw Redmond clinging on for protection, and when the going stopped the round Welsh had his man all but out. Welsh was himself loose in the third, and followed up his opponent so strongly that Redmond's only hope was in the clinch. The fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh rounds all went to Welsh in the same way. Redmond seemed to come back a little stronger in the eighth, but at no stage of the round was he dangerous. The ninth witnessed the only misjudged blow of Welsh from which he so speedily recovered that Redmond failed to find his man. The tenth and eleventh found Redmond rushing for a clinch, on the part of the referee could break. The twelfth and last round Welsh smothered his opponent with face and body blows until thirty seconds before the going sounded. Redmond took the defensive in a clinch, which the referee had difficulty in breaking. Popular opinion easily gave the victory to Welsh.

Welsh's head and footwork was the feature, but the steam of his blows since his last appearance here has improved remarkably to such an extent as can be judged when he so nearly scored a knockout, which would have been the first in his career. Redmond put up a game fight, but his clinches spoiled the effect.
