

LOCAL CIVIC MEETING

The civic meeting called by the City Clerk for Tuesday evening to discuss local political issues was largely attended, and the speakers each received a good hearing, in fact it was the most orderly meeting of the kind ever held in Fernie. Robert Duthie was selected by the meeting to act as chairman and officiated in his usual capable manner. He objected however to being called on to provide the program for the meeting and thought that the least the City Clerk could have done would be to have provided him with a list of speakers.

Mayor Uphill was the first speaker. He outlined the work of the council for the past year, giving the financial status of the City since he took office and appealed to the electors for their support on his past record.

Geo. B. Thompson then took the platform. He criticised Mayor Uphill's record since he had been in office, and appealed for votes on the grounds that he was not out for a salary, neither was he the servant of any particular interest. He was absolutely independent of any influence and having a large amount of time at his disposal could give the City affairs his undivided attention.

At this point Mayor Uphill asked Mr. Thompson some pertinent questions re salary and he in reply stated that if three aldermen would vote against receiving any salary he would vote with them and thus save the City \$1200 a year.

Edward Marsham also appealed to these present for their support in his campaign for the Mayor's chair. He was out for a clean city and an even break for everyone. He believed his record in the services of the city entitled him to the position of mayor. He attacked the mayor for disposing of some debentures for less than they had first been offered to local citizens.

Mayor Uphill explained that these debentures were a small allotment which had not been disposed of and an eastern firm had offered them 90 for them and they had accepted it.

The Rev. Carr, who appealed to the electors for their support for Police Commissioner, stated that it was common talk that if he was elected he would be out with the axe. He wished to inform the audience that this was not the case. He believed that the local police were not given the support they should receive from the commissioners. If the police commissioners were weak kneed he did not blame the police for being too lenient. If elected he would see that they were given every support, and then if they did not do their duty it would be time to start something.

Ald. Jackson also appealed for support in his candidacy for alderman and police commissioner. Bill made the speech of his life and certainly made a strong impression on the audience.

Robert McEwan, Dan Alton, Wm. Hunter and Wm. Robichaud also spoke briefly asking the audience for their support in the aldermanic fight.

Waldo, B.C., Jan. 11.—East Kootenay Chapter I.O.D.E., met in Adelphi Hall, Baynes Lake. The financial report for December showed that a good sum of money had gone through the treasury during that month. The amount paid out by the Chapter for that period was about

75. Besides this was the amount collected for the Halifax Relief Fund for the children of Halifax. In response to a letter addressed to the Chapter from the Provincial I.O.D.E., several members undertook to collect money for this urgent call. A total of \$322.45 was collected in Baynes and Waldo in a few days and forwarded at once.

Contributions to the Chapter's general fund included the proceeds of a "Silver" tea given by Mrs. J. Bough and Mrs. Clomans at Baynes Lake, which amounted to \$10.00, a Whist Drive at Baynes which netted \$11.50 and three Whist Drives at Waldo which cleared \$23.80.

Mrs. Griffith of Baynes Lake gave \$5.00 to pay for two copies of a Canadian historical picture which will be given to the schools at Baynes Lake and Waldo.

Contributions for the Canadian Red Cross Society were received as follows: From Mrs. Longworth of Elko the proceeds of a raffle \$16.00 From Mrs. Morrow, Baynes Lake a donation of \$5.00. Several weeks ago the Regent, Mrs. J. Bough offered a prize in each of the two schools for the best pair of socks knitted by a school girl before the January meeting of the I. O. D. E.

The prize in Baynes Lake was won by Margaret Blake. In the Waldo School two girls had made an equally good showing, Hilda Webb and Grace Taylor, so an extra prize is being given by Mrs. H. H. Ross.

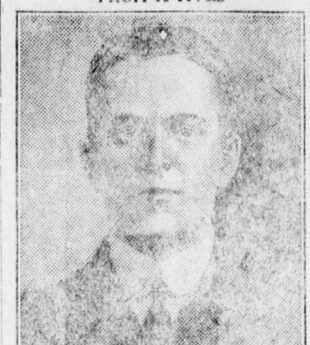
