MR. S. H. CLARK.
The Monitorean, Entertains an Audience in the Congregational Church.

A good-sized audience, representing for the most part church members from the different parts of the city and including several of the clergy assembled in the Congregational Church last evening to listen to the recital given by Mr. S. H. Clark, lecturer on election at Trinity College, Toronto, who has during the past year won distinction in the principal Canadian cities as an elocutionist.

The entertainment was in turn followed by far the most meritorious elocutionary efforts that have been listened to by the lovers of different numbers on the programme were of an excellent character, giving Mr. Clark ample opportunity of sustaining his claims as a versatile genius, eloquent as he did with remarkable ease and grace from the lightest and most frolicsome mirth to that of the pathetic and sorrowful.

The appreciation of the audience was greatly heightened by the care taken by the lecturer to preface with lucid and explanatory remarks such of the numbers as he thought might not be fully understood by the audience.

The entertainment commenced with an excellent rendering of Tennyson's beautiful ballad of the fleet entitled "The Revenge," which was in turn followed by a humorous sketch "The Lightning Rod Dispenser" by Carleton. Mr. Clark's representation of the old Yankee farmer's experience with the lightning rod agent in genuine Eastern dialect was productive of much laughter. The lecturer generally introduced two short pieces not mentioned on the programme, both of them models in English literature. The title of the first number was "Yes or No," it being an illustration of Dutch courtship, and the second of somewhat similar nature entitled "That Old Sweetheart of Mine," to both of which the elocutionist did full justice. Perhaps the full richness of his voice was not heard to such advantage in any of the numbers as it was in his rendition of Rev. J. W. Sanborn's poem "The Two Bells," being illustrative of the contest going on between right and wrong, and in which he exhibited wonderful powers of intonation. The first part of the programme concluded with the "Chario Race" (adapted from Lewis Carroll's "Alice in Wonderland"). This is one of the most powerful pieces of descriptive writing in English literature, and its effect is greatly increased when handled by such an able artist as Mr. Clark. The climax is reached in the last few lines when Ben Hur calls to his steeds for the crowning effort which places him in front of his adversary and wins the race.
