We are, as the ADVERTISER has before ow stated, on the eve of a Provincial General Election, and all along the line the parties are getting ready for the day of battle by placing candidates in the field, laying down platforms, and defending records. The Government, with Oliver Mowat at its head, is about to be placed on trial by the people, as it has already been in the legislative halls, and the electors will be called upon to give a verdict according to the evidence. Such is the right of Canadian free men, and on their decision all Governments in Ontario must stand or fall.
