We, the Liberal party of Chada, in convention assembled declare:

That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, upon the protective principle, but upon the requirements of the public service.

That the existing tariff, founded upon an unsound principle and used is it has been by the Government as a compling agency, wherewith to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trust and combinations;

tions;

It has decreased the value of farm and other landed property;

It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few; It has checked immigration;

It has caused great loss of population; It has impeded commerce; It has discriminated against Great

It has discriminated against Great Britain.

In these, and in many chor ways, it has occasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must cathinue to grow in intensity so long as the pasent tariff system remains in force.

That the highest intensits of Canada demand a removal of the obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign tracte and hasten the return of prosperity to our people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of houest, economical and efficient government.

That it should be so djusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessaries of life and should be so arranged as to promite free trade with the whole world, more particularly Great

the necessaries of life and should be so arranged as to promite free trade with the whole world, mor particularly Great Britain and the United States.

We believe that the results of the pretective system have grisvously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profees their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection.

must be based only on the principle of protection.

We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fall to afford any substantial relief from the burdons under which the country labors.
