Liberal and Conservative
Gains Are EqualSo Far in the British Election
Contest—Lord Cromer Called

BRITISH ELECTIONS.

London, Thursday, Oct. 11.—3:30 a.m.
The Liberals have been doing far
better in the counties in the parlia-
mentary general election than they did
in the boroughs. Yesterday they gained
two more seats—Cardiff and the
Ottley division of Yorkshire, thus equal-
izing the party gains. The ministerial-
ists and the opposition have now gained
27 seats each. Apart from Sir
Henry Campbell-Bannerman's reduced
majority in Strathcona, and the
success of Sir Edward J. Reed at Car-
diff, a seat formerly held by Mr. Jas.
M. MacLean, prominent in Indian af-
fairs, who did not seek re-election,
there is little of special interest in yester-
day's returns.The ministerialists now hold 357 seats
and the opposition 265.

THE LIBERAL LEADER'S VIEWS.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, ad-
dressing his supporters after the poll
had been declared, said he was satis-
fied with the result, considering the
state of the country and the "most
disadvantageous circumstances for an
election that an ingenious government
could devise."

BRUTAL ASSAULT.

Sir Robert Fitzgerald, the newly re-
elected Conservative member for
Cambridge city, was brutally assailed
and kicked in the head by roughs
and badly injured with a dangerous
country meeting yesterday evening.

BRITONS GIVE THANKS.

London, Oct. 11.—England is in the
midst of her annual thanksgiving
season, and most of the churches
throughout the country are decorated
with grain, fruit and flowers symbol-
ic of the nation's gratitude to a boun-
tiful Providence. St. Paul's Cathed-
ral, elaborately embellished with
the products of the harvest, was the
scene of a grand service, at-
tended by thousands of people.

LORD CROMER CALLED.

Baron Cromer, the British diplomatic
agent and consul-general in Egypt,
has been summoned to England, ac-
cording to the Cairo correspondent of the
Daily Express. It is understood in Cairo
that he will not return to Egypt, and it
is believed he will become a member of
the new cabinet. The Daily Express
suggests that it is not impossible that
Lord Cromer will replace the Marquis
of Londonderry, secretary of state for
war, and says that a combination of
Cromer, Kitchener and Roberts would
insure public confidence in a thorough
reform of the war office.

The List of Candidates Fast
Filling Up.In Five Constituencies Elections Will
Be Held Later Than Nov. 7—Dates
of Coming Conventions.At a convention of North Lanark, B.
Rosmond, the sitting member, was re-
nominated.The Liberal convention for Wright
will be held in Hull on the 18th inst.Dr. E. Jamieson, of Ottawa, has de-
clined the Conservative nomination for
Carleton.The Liberals of Carleton county
will meet in convention at Stittsville,
Oct. 19.Woodstock Express: It is not certain
that there will be a candidate in North
Ottawa in the Conservative interests,
but it is said that Mr. Charles Muma
would not decline a nomination.On Friday night the Liberals of
Hamilton will meet in convention to
nominate candidates for the Dominion
Parliament.Ald. Oulmet, Quebec, has been cho-
sen as the Conservative candidate to
oppose Mayor Prefontaine in Maison-
neuve at the general elections.Robert MacKay, chairman of the
Montreal harbor board, has been offered
the Liberal nomination in St. An-
toine division of Montreal.Premier Macdonald on Tuesday hand-
ed in his resignation as attorney-gen-
eral of Manitoba, and Hon. H. Camp-
bell was sworn in as his successor in
that capacity. Mr. Macdonald will re-
tain his place as premier and president
of the council, until after Mr. Roblin's
return.Halifax Liberals have nominated Mr.
Wm. Roche, merchant, and Mr. W. B.
Watson, M.P.P., barrister.

WILL VOTE LATER ON.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—There are five con-
stituencies in Canada in which the
elections will likely be held on a later
date than the date fixed for the gen-
eral elections. These are two of the
10 British Columbia, one in Ontario
and two in Quebec.The constituencies in British Colum-
bia are Burrard and Yale, and in Que-
bec, Gaspé and Saguenay.The writs for these constituencies
have been forwarded to the returning
officers and they will fix the dates.
The statute provides for this.

was one of the largest and most en-
thusiastic ever held in the riding. 170
delegates out of a total of 174 being pre-
sent. The following were elected offi-
cers of the Liberal Association: Hon-
orary president, Luc Montreuil, Walk-
erville; president, Francis Cleary, of
Windsor; vice-president, J. D. A.
Deziel, Rochester; secretary, J. H.
Rodd, Windsor. William McGregor,
M.P., made a brief address. A resolu-
tion was adopted, congratulating Mr.
William McGregor, M.P., on the mark-
ed success of the Liberal administra-
tion, and expressing appreciation of
his actions while representing the
constituency. Mr. McGregor replied
briefly, and the meeting concluded with
cheers for the Queen, Premier Laurier

toms, is likely to be at Woodstock on
Saturday, Oct. 20, speaking at Drumbo
the day previous to a joint meeting ar-

To Fight

Convalescent Canadians Re-
turn to South Africa.How Five Brave Strathconas
Fought to a Finish.Rhodes Declares Krugerism Has Van-
ished—Plan for Assisting Boer
Prisoners When Released.London, Oct. 11.—The following non-
commissioned officers and men of the
Canadian special service forces invalid-
ed to England, embarked on Sept. 22
for South Africa to rejoin their re-
spective corps:

Canadian Mounted Rifles—No. 17,
Trumpeter R. Agassiz. Second special
service battalion, R. C. R.—No. 7,005,
Corp. W. P. Powle; No. 7,070, Corp. A.
O. Lohman; No. 4,259, Pte. A. Peters.
PROMOTED.

Lieut.-Col. Gordon, of Montreal, who
was attached to the second Canadian
contingent for special duties, has been
gazetted assistant staff officer to the
prisoners of war, and graded as deputy
assistant adjutant-general.

FOUGHT TO THE DEATH.

A special dispatch from Lydenburg
says: A Boer prisoner tells the story
of the way in which a patrol of five
troopers in Strathcona's Horse, under
Sergt. Brothers, met death. It appears
that they were suddenly surrounded by
a strong force of Boers. The Canadians
indignantly refused to surrender, and
a murderous fire was exchanged at
short range until every man in the
party was riddled with bullets, but not
before each Canadian had accounted
for three Boers. Sir Redvers Buller,
while passing through Machadoodorp
and bidding farewell to the troops, said
he should be greatly pleased to tell
Lord Strathcona of the magnificent
work of his troopers.

BRITISH PRISONER ESCAPED.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 11.—Sir Alfred
Miles cables as follows:
"Cape Town, Oct. 10.—No. 305, Car-
ter, Canadian Mounted Rifles, severely
wounded and since prisoner of war,
escaped from Wonderfontein 7th Oc-
tober."Gerald St. Legere Carter was of the
Manitoba Dragoons.

BOERS ENTER PICKSWICK.

A dispatch from Maseru, dated yester-
day, says that 100 Boers have en-
tered Ficksburg, routing the police,
who fled across the Basutoiland border.

WILLING TO RESIGN.

The Cape Town News states that
ex-Premier Schreiner has issued a cir-
cular to each voter in his constituency,
asking for their individual wishes re-
garding his resignation from the Col-
onial Parliament. He declares that if
the replies show that the majority is
opposed to the policy he has been ad-
vocating that he will resign.

TO HELP PRISONERS.

Cape Town, Oct. 11.—The treason
tribunals will be convened on Oct. 29,
by ex-Attorney-General Solomon
presiding judge. The imperial gov-
ernment is considering a plan for the
assistance of prisoners of war when
they return to their farms.

CECIL RHODES' VIEWS.

Cape Town, Oct. 11.—Mr. Cecil
Rhodes received an ovation on assum-
ing the presidency of the congress of
the South African War Veterans. During
the course of his address he attributed
the South African war to the "Mug-
wumps," and said that but for them
Mr. Kruger would never have dared to
send an ultimatum to Great Britain.Rhodes declared that now that
"Krugerism had vanished," Great
Britain would establish a liberal gov-
ernment, "which would do everything
possible to unite the interests of South
Africa with those of the empire." Mr.
Rhodes also said there was no desire
"to plaster Rhodesia on Cape Colony."Intimating that it was "likelier to be
the other way." But he thought
Rhodesia would be one of the federated
states, with great opportunities for ex-
pansion in the direction of the Congo.
He then said:

AFTER THE WAR.

"Now that the battle is over the dis-
putes on the origin of the war ought
to cease. The race question must be
subordinated. The league should sup-
port three points—the supremacy of
the flag, equal rights and show the
Dutch that there is no feeling against
them. Having won what is entitled
to the league ought to demonstrate
that the interests of the races are the
same. Then there would be great
hopes for the country."The league adopted a resolution
approving the government's policy and
the splendid services of Sir Alfred
Miles, and tendering sincere thanks
to the colonies for the imperial spirit
which prompted them to send troops
to South Africa.BRIEFS FOR
BUSY READERSThe public prosecutor at Paris has
issued instructions to the police to ar-
rest summarily any persons who pub-
licly utter insults against the presi-
dent.The board of ordnance and fortifica-
tions, which has been holding a pro-
tracted session in Washington, has re-
commended that no more disappearing
gun carriages be made.M. T. Comley, of Madoc, has issued
a writ in an action of criminal con-
duct against Dr. D. Archer, of Port Perry,
claiming \$10,000 damages for alleged
alienation of his wife's affections.The city and street railway authori-
ties of Toronto have resumed hostil-
ities, on the refusal of the company
to put vestibules on the rear end of
cars, as required by the city bylaw.Three burglars, with masks, revol-
vers and other tools of the trade, op-
erated in the west end of Toronto on
Tuesday night; visited four houses,
shot at a policeman and got clear
away.A Port Daihouse dispatch says: As
the new ocean steamer Wacnamaw
was entering local bound down, she
ran too far ahead. She struck the twolower gates and twisted them, and they
will have to be replaced by new gates.
Requisition papers, issued by Gov.
Sayers, of Texas, have been served on
Gov. Roosevelt at St. Louis for the
extradition of John D. Rockefeller and
knocked a hole in her bow. When she
got down fifteen miles to Varennes it
was found she was leaking badly. Her
forward compartment has several feet
of water in it.

SCHREIBER'S "SWAG."

New York, Oct. 11.—The police be-
lieve that Wm. Schreiber, who embe-
zzled \$100,000 from the Elizabethport
Banking Company of Elizabethport, N.
J., is hiding in this city. Mrs. Anna
Hart, on whom Schreiber lavished the
bank's money, is said to have diamonds
worth \$20,000 and \$12,000 in cash, the
remnants of Schreiber's "peculations."
She admits that Schreiber lived with
her under the name of Wm. Hart, but
says she has seen nothing of him since
Aug. 18.

THE PROHIBITION CANDIDATE.

Chicago, Oct. 11.—John G. Woolley,
Prohibition candidate for president,
met with a warm reception at Handel
Hall. Hundreds of local Prohibition-
ists attended the meeting which was
preceded by a parade. Addresses were
delivered by Volney B. Cushing and
John G. Woolley. The Prohibition
special train with Candidate Woolley
and party, has concluded a nine days'
trip through the South. John G. Wool-
ley said: "The peculiarity of our work
in Indiana is that we seem to draw
our converts about evenly from the old
parties."

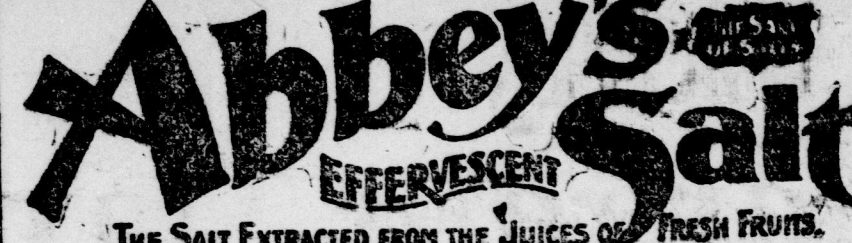

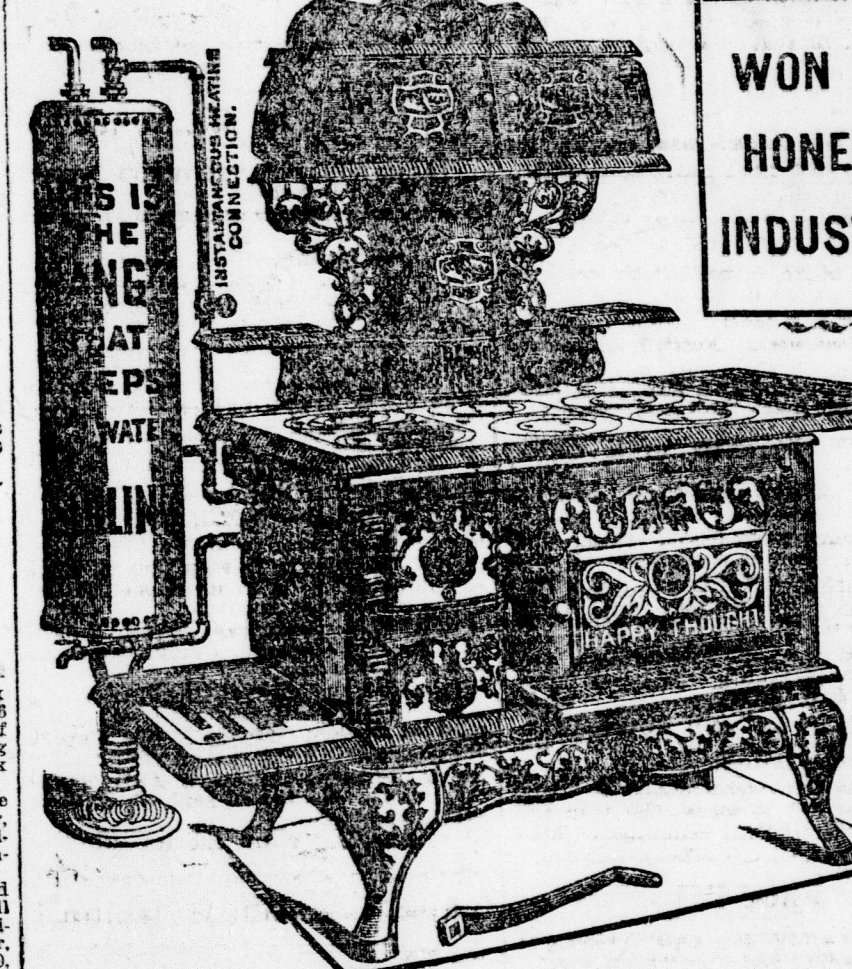
