G. V. McLean, M.A., of Markham, has been appointed mathematical master of the Paris, Ont., high school by the board of education.

Edward Scamian, an old and esteemed resident of Sarnia, died on Sunday. He had been ill for some time past with kidney trouble and was aged 66 years.

Two bylaws, authorizing the issue of debentures to the amount of \$58,000, for the installing of a domestic water service and purchasing the electric light plant, were carried at Ayrmer, Ont., on Monday.

A heavily laden freight car was thrown from the track and badly smashed at the Grand Trunk station, Woodstock, late Saturday night. The car had been placed on a siding during the day, but was not shunted clear of the switch.

Windsor Record: As the early morning train on the G. T. R. Saturday was coming through Walkerville a small stone came crashing through the window, striking a Tecumseh woman. A short time ago a board was hurled through a car window above Walkerville.

Arthur Wiseman, of Walkerville, met with a very serious injury at the basket factory in Walkerville. His right arm came into contact with a saw and in a moment it was nearly severed just below the elbow. The bones were cut through and the forearm and hand hung by the flesh.

Mrs. Joseph Langis, wife of a farmer living on the Maiden road, complained to Magistrate Bartlett at Windsor that her husband threatened to kill her. Mrs. Langis says Langis refuses to let the children go to church because he does not believe in religion. The magistrate issued a warrant for the arrest of Langis.

A TORONTO SENSATION.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—A great sensation was caused last night by the arrest of Rose McC. Cameron, of the meteorological department, a prominent member of Little Trinity Church, on a charge under the Chariton act, preferred by James A. Henry, caretaker of the church, on behalf of his little 12-year-old daughter. Bail was accepted.

GREAT GALL OF THE GAULS

Frenchmen Descant on the Ease
With Which They Could
Thrash the British.

Mr. Chaplin Retired From the British
Cabinet at Lord Salisbury's Request
—Rosebery Would Accept the
Liberal Leadership Under
Certain Conditions.

Paris, Dec. 5.—Gen. Mercier caused a deep sensation in the senate yesterday during the debate on the naval bill, by pointing out the ease by which England could be invaded. He demanded that they introduce into the plans for the mobilization of the army the navy methods for the rapid embarkation and debarkation of an expeditionary corps.

The president declared that such proposals were out of order, and the senate adjourned.

Gen. Mercier said, in the course of an extraordinary view of the possibility of war with Great Britain. The use of the army is not sufficiently taken into account. The Transvaal war has shown that the British army, although brave, is not equal to the task which England expected it to perform. The British navy is powerful, but it has many coasts to defend. France, therefore, is, numerically, England's equal at certain points, and is even her superior in the instruments of destruction. A landing in England is therefore not beyond realization. I venture to think that the work I prepared while commanding an army corps should serve as a basis for such a project, which would not be excessive.

At this point protests were raised, and M. Fallieres asked Gen. Mercier not to enter into the details of the scheme.

Gen. Mercier replied that the scheme could be "held over the head of England," and he proposed a resolution that the senate should invite the government to complete immediately preparations for the mobilization of the army and navy by preparing everything necessary to embark and disembark as rapidly as possible an expeditionary corps.

Protests were raised from various benches, and M. De Lencan, minister of marine, followed the president's ruling that the motion was out of order in the present debate by declaring, amid cheers, that the government could not possibly accept it.

AWFUL MURDER IN PARIS.
The severed head, arms and legs of a young man have been discovered in some waste ground near the Rue des Filles-du-Calvaire, and another package containing a disembowelled and otherwise mutilated body was found in a gateway on the Rue du Faubourg St. Denis, a mile and a half distant.

The two discoveries apparently connect with the same murder, that of an unknown man.

The first package was deposited late Monday night by six men, who were seen from a dwelling-house opposite. The crime has caused a great sensation.

WOMEN RUN A PARIS BAR.
An American bar, run by two women, is the latest attraction of the Boulevard. The place is jammed. The proprietors are Louise Butler and Juliette Penie, who acquired notoriety in New York by giving fencing exhibitions to the police.

A BABY MURDERER.
A great sensation has been caused in Arras, nine miles northwest of Lille, by a crime committed by a child of eight upon another of two years of age. Valentine Dilly, the daughter of a poverty-stricken parent, saw a baby lying in the street holding a cake. She endeavored to take it from the infant, and when the latter resisted, dragged her into the house, forced her into a trunk, stabbed her in the arms and legs a dozen times, and inflicted terrible wounds in the stomach with a shoemaker's knife. The infant is not expected to recover. Valentine Dilly at first confessed the crime, but finally confessed a brother of the crime.

THE LIBERAL LEADERSHIP.

London, Dec. 5.—The Standard says that it learns that Lord Rosebery would resume the leadership of the Liberal party, but that Sir William Vernon Harcourt and Mr. John Morley decline to pledge themselves to support his policy.

Henry Chaplin, president of the government board in the late cabinet, in the course of a letter to one of its constituents of the Scotch division of Lincolnshire, reveals the fact that Lord Salisbury requested him to resign. He supposes the request was made "because it was necessary to create vacancies for new blood."

At first, Mr. Chaplin, president of the English Church Union, and one of the leaders of the ritualistic section in the Church of England, is, according to the Dublin Evening Herald, about to join the Church of Rome.

A PACIFIC CABLE.

London, Dec. 5.—The Pacific Cable Company has been established, and the governments of Great Britain, New South Wales, Queensland and New Zealand, the bid of the Telegraph Construction and Maintenance Company to lay a cable from Vancouver

It is understood that the Dominion ministry have given renewed assurance to their friends of their firm intention to complete the fast Atlantic project to completion at the earliest possible moment.

CABLE NOTES.

Rudyard Kipling will sail for Cape Town next Saturday, and will remain some months in South Africa recruiting his health.

A dispatch from Warsaw announces the death, from paralysis of the heart, of Prince Emeritinsky, the popular governor-general of Poland.

A Rome dispatch says: "In consequence of the rise of the River Tiber, the Quay Anguillara, 300 yards long, which had been undermined, slid into the river. The damage done is estimated at 2,000,000 lire.

The hearing of the libel suit brought by Col. Henry's widow against M. Joseph Reinach, who in articles published in the Paris Siecle accused Henry of being the real traitor in the Dreyfus case, and said Esterhazy was his accomplice, opened on Monday in the Paris assize court. Dreyfus may be a witness.

Emperor William's decree regarding reforms in the higher schools has elicited varied comments. The Liberal papers of Berlin generally commend the addition of instruction in the English language to the classical curriculum, but they point out that it will be almost impossible to carry the plan into execution under the existing arrangements. On the other hand, the Agrarian and Conservative journals argue against the introduction of English.

PARISIAN BROKE DOWN.

Halifax, Dec. 5.—At midnight, the steamer Parisian, from Liverpool, was reported off the harbor. Later a pilot-boat reported that the Parisian had broken up off Sarnia. The boat made all haste to the city, as the steamer requires all available assistance. She is now anchored between Ketch harbor and Sarnia. The storm is increasing in fury.
