DEFINITELY IN THE FIELD FOR MAYOR!

Peter Birtwistle Will Run This Year and Next.

Will Run as a Straight Independent Candidate.

Ald. Winnett Will Make No Announcement as Yet—He Is Simply Waiting To Be Asked.

Mr. Peter Birtwistle is definitely in the field for mayor.

To The Advertiser he said this morning:

"You may say positively that I am in the field. I will run this year, and if I am defeated, I will run again for 1903."

"You will run under what auspices?" he was asked.

"Under none. I will run neither as Gladstonian nor Tory. I don't represent any class, either. I am a straight independent, running simply in the interests of the city."

"What will your policy be?" "I'll announce that later," Mr. Birtwistle replied. Briefly, it is economy with efficiency.

"Do you know your opponent well?" he was asked.

"No, I can't say that I do. You know the talk is that Ald. Winnett will be. I met him on the street the other day and asked him, but he said he didn't know."

"I told him that if he ran it would be a friendly fight. If he got in, why alright, but I wouldn't mind a fight."
