Winnett will probably take advantage of the slip. No one seriously thinks that Ald. Cooper intends to pass by the people, especially the workingmen, and take from them their chance to express an opinion upon a subject so important to them as the McClary exemption.

The talk in the mayor's office at noon today turned upon the subject of mayoralty candidates. "I think that no man should run

for mayor who has not had one or two years' experience as an alderman," his worship said. Unless he is an unusually bright man he would be no use whatever the first year. A man who has had no experience in municipal life has no idea of what he should know and do."

Ald. Winnett has received assurance that his claim for more street railway is justified. The only doubtful point is raised by the West London extension, even granting that the mile of track over there should be counted against the city, legal authorities say that the city may rightly ask for a large extension, and the South street proposition to make a belt line seems to be the best scheme for using it.

## HAD A BEE TO FIX CEMETERY.

Catholic and Protestant Farmers Work Together.

The Fact Delighted Father Aylward, Why Says They Doubled the Grave-

yard's Capacity.

Barn raising bees and husking bees, bees for plowing and bees for sewing -these are neither few nor odd in the country roundabout London, but it remained for the Roman Catholics of the township to have one that is surely unique-a bee for getting ready a graveyard for its future occupants. A census of the old cemetery out Quebec street way was taken some time ago and showed that however hesitatingly the population of other places was growing, this one place was filled to the fence-rails. It was necessary, if a final resting place in holy ground was to be the portion of the departed, to make the cemetery bigger. It was after this had been done that the idea of a bee to fix it for use entered some fertile mind-whose, has not yet been disclosed. Much gravel was needed, and all the Catholic farmers decided to help provide it. So the land was blessed and the work begun.

Then came a little surprise, and it was one that pleased Father Aylward, he says, more than anything that has happened since he came to London. A large number of Protestant farmers volunteered to help. All day Thursday Catholics and Protestants worked with a right good will, preparing a pleasant graveyard for the Catholic They dined together at the new home of the caretaker and then went at it again. When they had worked the day out and the tired teams rested, more than half the job was done, and they all spent the evening in a happy frolic at the chief residence in the graveyard. A new entrance on Quebec street has been built and 600 trees bought. These, when planted, will add immensely to the beauty of the place, so that, all considered, things at the cemetery seem
