MUNDY SHOWS

Will Exhibit Here Week of June 19 Under Auspices of Old Boys.

John W. Moore, general press representative and promoter of the great Mundy shows arrived in the city last night, and will take up the reins of advertising the largest and most beautiful carnival company in America. CUTTING DOWN THE REGIMENTS

Recent Order Better Approved Of As It Becomes Fully Understood.

The late militia order issued by the Government has been causing a great deal of comment all over the country. But the better the order is becoming understood, the more it is appreciated by critics. As explained in a recent issue of The Advertiser, the order has little practical effect upon the Seventh Regiment. Regiments which were recruited and offered by the Dundonald standard, such as the Ottawa corps, will certainly be affected appreciably. But it must be remembered that it is necessary to prevent the military expenditure from assuming dimensions which would impose a serious burden upon the people. The whole of the military expenditure for the year has not yet been submitted to Parliament, but when the supplementary estimates are brought down by the Minister of Militia it will probably be found that the total military expenditure will not be less than \$5,000,000. The military expenditure is therefore in the aggregate very far in excess of any previous year, probably nearly double, and it represents a tax of \$1 a head upon every man, woman and child in the country—that is to say, several dollars upon each adult taxpayer.

A very large part of this year's additional expenditure is the result of taking on the military expenditure assumed by the imperial authorities in regard to the military establishments at Halifax and Esplanade. The past has largely been left to the Northwest Police, must now be provided for on a scale commensurate with the new provincial status, and this will include military organization on something like the same plan as Manitoba.

The Northwest Mounted Police are not sufficient. There must be a properly constructed defense force with the necessary establishments in the chief centers of population.

Following is the establishment authorized by the Dundonald scheme for an eight-company regiment:

Officers..... 46
Staff-sergeants and sergeants..... 90
Drummers and buglers..... 25
Rank and file..... 296

Total, all ranks..... 457

The peculiarity about this establishment was that it provided for double the number of officers and sergeants needed. This was done with the object of training the extra officers and non-coms. in time of peace, and in the night of the emergency should the active regiment be ordered out on service. The new establishment made in view of the fact that it is much more difficult and takes much more time to train officers than to train men. Consequently pay was allowed for the regimental strength and the base officers and non-coms. as well. The new establishment cuts off these base officers and non-coms. It should be noted that there will be but little reduction in the strength of companies, as the reduction is made entirely by cutting off the officers and sergeants, as already stated. Under the old establishment there were 240 privates; under the new establishment the figures for the different ranks are as follows:

Officers..... 32
Sergeants..... 33
Buglers..... 8
Rank and file..... 294

Total, all ranks..... 367
The rank and file is made up of 20 privates and 24 corporals. It will be seen, then, that the reduction amounts to 418 men, and that the new establishment is 49 men more than the old. The reduction in the number of officers and non-coms, drawing higher pay, it will readily be seen, is a saving to the city corps that are up to strength, and will cut their pay into the regimental account.

The Seventh Regiment, however, has not been cut down. The new establishment authorized, and has not more than 25 men in all ranks. It will, therefore, lose nothing.

LONDON'S NEW BANK

Business of Sovereign Bank Shows Large Increase for the Year.

The Sovereign Bank of Canada, which recently opened a branch in this city, on Richmond street, opposite the city hall, have issued a statement of the year's business to April 29, 1905. Local shareholders will be pleased at the substantial increase in every department. Every appointment necessary for the promotion of a financial institution has been placed in the branch of the bank in London, and under the able management of Mr. Frank E. Karm, the bank is sure to receive its share of city and country business.

In the statement mentioned above, the deposits show a total of \$8,316,000, an increase over last year of \$2,000,000. The assets increased from \$8,994,000 to \$11,565,000. Profits were satisfactory, amounting to \$134,000, or more than double the amount required to pay dividends. The quarterly dividends were paid, amounting to \$65,000, and \$50,000 transferred to reserve fund which has now reached \$400,000. The sum of \$10,000 was written off bank premises account, and \$5,000 applied to rebate of discount on bills not yet due, leaving \$10,000 carried forward to credit of profit and loss account. The bank's note circulation shows an increase of about \$100,000 over last year. The general manager says that the limit was frequently approached during the year. This fact caused the directors to issue additional capital to the extent of \$325,000, bringing the total capital up to \$1,625,000, a proportion of one share of new stock to every four of the old. The issue is made at \$125 per share. The premium of 25 per cent will be added to reserve fund. The directors also indicate to the shareholders that they may expect an increase in dividend in the near future, and that the stock of the Sovereign Bank of Canada will be listed on the Montreal and Toronto exchanges early in July.

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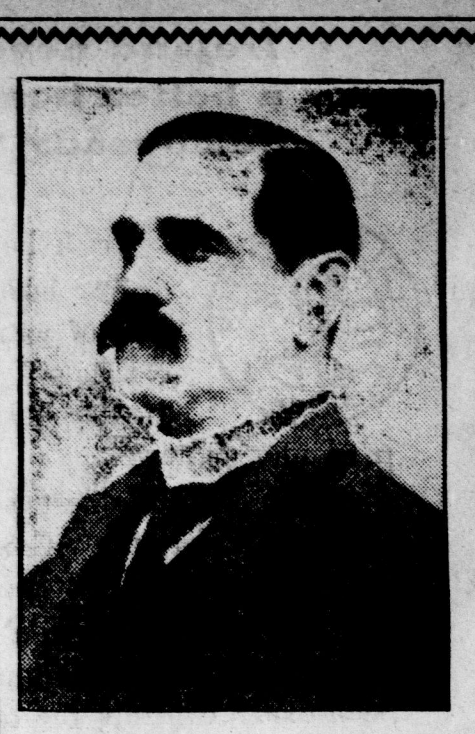
