NEW QUARTERMASTER

Mr. Haldane Appoints General Nich-

son to the Position.

London, Jan. 11.—The appointment of
Gen. Sir William Nicholson as quar-
termaster-general to the forces is the first
important act of the new Secretary for
War. It is taken as an augury that all
his future policy may be equally bold
and equally well-advised.

Gen. Sir William Nicholson is one of
the hardest workers in the army command
at present, and also one of its keenest
critics. He knows the ins and outs of
the army administration, how laboriously
fumbling it has become, and what is need-
ed to make it effective and direct.

He may consider himself somewhat ex-
perienced in war office work, for he has
been in the last administration, wanted to send
him to Gibraltar, that unpromising rock,
a kind of military St. Helena, where you
may be decently buried alive.

He has been unusually brilliant record
of active service. He fought in the Afghan
war, marched to Kandahar, served in
Egypt, in the Sudan, and more recently in
South Africa, where he was at the head
of the transport column.

Later still he became director-general
of mobilization and military intelligence
at the war office. He found that there
was no "intelligence" there to direct. And
the lack of intelligence, that to get him
officially interested in Gibraltar.

Russia's Gloomy Budget;
Due to War and RevoltHundreds of Millions Needed to Balance Credits—
Another Rebel Band Annihilated.

Moscow, Jan. 11.—News has just
reached this city of a daring attempt of
the revolutionists to capture a military
train conveying a large sum of money
from St. Petersburg to Libau.

A band of revolutionists, having ad-
vanced information, gathered at Hazen-
burg, burned two bridges and tore up the
track.

Two companies of infantry, which were
escorting the train, left the cars and were
joined by a detachment of dragoons.

This force marched against the revolu-
tionists, who, from behind improvised
defenses, opened fire on the soldiers.

The infantry, after firing two volleys,
which killed 50 and wounded nearly 100
of the revolutionists, charged with the
bayonet, and the dragoons completed the
route by sabering the revolutionists they
overtook.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 11.—The budget
statement for 1906, which was issued to-
night, shows that it will be necessary
to raise \$240,500,000 by credit operations
to balance the estimated receipts and
expenditures.

The latter included \$202,500,000 for the
liquidation of the expenses of the
Russo-Japanese war, the repatriation
of the troops in the far east and the
reduction of the army to a peace foot-
ing. For the first time the total cost
of the war, \$1,050,000,000, is revealed.

The budget includes the recent authoriza-
tion of \$200,000,000 in treasury bonds, \$75,000,
000 of which have already been used to
renew the Mendelssohn loan, and the
credit of \$100,000,000, which former
Minister Kowosoff is now
negotiating in Paris.

The primary object of the latter, the
proceeds of which will be retained in
Paris, is the maintenance of the stability
of the rouble.

The budget statement does not dodge
the prevailing conditions in Russia. It

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
