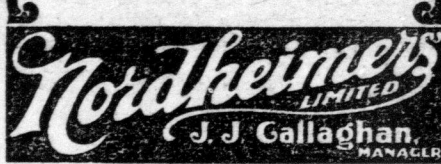

THE TASKMASTER OF THE CONGO

King Leopold's Oppressive Rule—The Marvelous Results of Missionary Effort.

Rev. Arthur J. Bowen, pastor of the Egeon Street Baptist Church, who was for a number of years in the Congo, gave a very interesting address last night in Adelaide Street Church. The occasion was the annual thank-offering meeting of the Women's Mission Circle, and a deeply interested audience filled the schoolroom. Rev. T. Shields presided, and the proceedings were varied by a well-rendered selection by the choir, a vocal solo, "Lead, Kindly Light," by Mr. Richards, and a much-appreciated cornet solo by Mr. Fred Gillies. Miss Raymond and Miss Gillies were the accompanists.

Mr. Bowen, in introducing his subject, said that while they thanked God for the great work done in India, China and Bolivia, he hoped they would be equally interested in the country which Livingstone had called "The Open Sore of the World," and which Stanley had aptly styled "The Dark Continent." The speaker gave a very interesting description of the journey from England or Holland to the station in the Upper Congo country, which used to take four months, but can now be accomplished in six or seven weeks. Africa is a land of rivers, but the Congo caps them all, being 2,000 miles in length, 9 miles wide at its mouth, and pours a million tons of water a minute into the South Atlantic Ocean. He noted the fact, often overlooked, that the Congo country is almost as large as India.

Mr. Bowen strongly deprecated the policy of European powers in allowing King Leopold of Belgium—one of the most unprincipled of rulers—to control the Congo, and described at length the brutal and murderous methods by which the natives were terrorized, and compelled to supply the Belgian Government's agents with the valuable white rubber and other products of the country, at a mere nominal sum, these products being sold in European markets at an enormous profit. The demoralizing effect of Belgian rule was also pointed out. "It were better," said the speaker, "if the natives had remained savages, than to be ruled by King Leopold of Belgium."

Mr. Bowen described the characteristics and customs of the Congo natives, their dread and hatred of their oppressors, and told of his own varied and sometimes thrilling experiences among this people. He also spoke with much feeling of the marvelous power of the gospel message, in transforming these fierce cannibals into peaceful, industrious and lovable Christian men and women.

At the close of the meeting the audience was given an opportunity of examining Mr. Bowen's large collection of curios from the Congo, including weapons of war and products of native art and industry.

A PLEASANT SURPRISE

Young People of U. E. Church Present Address to Their Pastor.

The Rev. H. G. Schwake, of the United Evangelical Church, was last evening tendered a pleasant surprise by 35 members of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor at his home, 114 Wellington street.

The president of the society read an address, in which he commented highly on the growth of the society since the pastor had taken the church, after which luncheon was served by the ladies. Games were played and a pleasant evening was spent all around.

QUARTERBACK PRAYED

Impressive Scene at Banquet When Tad Jones Tells His Part of Victory.

New Haven, Nov. 26.—The story was told on the Yale campus today about one passage in the speech of Tad Jones, the Yale quarterback, at the Yale banquet in Boston after the game with Harvard on Saturday night, that interested all the Yale men who heard it. Jones made a good speech, full of enthusiasm, and then stopped. Everyone thought he had finished, but he remained on his feet.

Then he began again slowly and with some hesitation: "It's a funny thing to tell here, fellows, but I want to say that this morning I felt that I did not have it," meaning that he felt he was not able to do his part in the coming contest. "I want to my room and pray, and when I came back downstairs I felt that I had it."

Jones sat down amid a dead silence. The statement, coming from a man who is at the head of religious life at Yale, and of whose sincerity there could be no doubt, impressed everyone in the room. The silence lasted for nearly half a minute, and then the applause came.
