

EEL WINS 2:00 PACE AT KALAMAZOO, MICH.

THE EEL TRIUMPHS OVER GLASSY FIELD OF PACERS AT KAZOO

Grey Ghost Goes Fastest Heat of Season in Closing Feature of Grand Circuit Events—Country Jay Takes the 2:10 Trotting Stake.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 6.—The greatest racing race of the year featured the closing day of Grand Circuit racing at Recreation Park this afternoon and the big crowd cheered itself hoarse when The Eel, the wonderful little gray stallion from Canada, vanquished such great pacers as Hedgewood Boy, Citation and Alleen Wilson. It was a race full of thrills and in each heat the race record for the season, made by Lady Maud C. last week at Detroit, was beaten.

The Eel.

The Eel was favored in the betting at \$25, Hedgewood Boy bringing \$11 and the field \$7. Hedgewood Boy drew the pole, but did not hold it long. The Eel pacing around him on the turn and taking the lead, Hedgewood Boy was right at his side going up the back stretch and when they turned into the stretch it seemed that he would win. The Eel was under the whip from the seven-eighths pole, but fought gamely and Hedgewood Boy made a break 50 feet from the wire. The Eel won in 2:03, the fastest heat of the season.

The Eel a Favorite.

The Eel was a 1 to 2 favorite before the second heat, and as in the previous heat went out in front with Hedgewood Boy making the fight. They were at the half in 1:01, but entering the turn Hedgewood Boy left his feet. Citation and Alleen Wilson were close up this time and both went after the flying gray. Old Citation was pacing a two-minute gait when they turned into the stretch for the dash home, and Alleen Wilson was holding her own. The drive through the stretch was one of the most exciting ever seen on a race track. McEwen, Cox and McMahon were using all the arts of expert reinsmen and whips were cracking as the three horses came to the wire nose and nose. Right at the finish, The Eel managed to catch the judges' eye, winning in 2:02 1/2, for the second time beating the race record for the season.

The Country Jay Again.

The 2:10 trotting stake was a good contest and again the veteran Country Jay was returned the winner. The old fellow was favored in the betting on account of his splendid race at Detroit last week while Maxine, Miss Adell and Carroll were well supported. The first heat was won by Country Jay rather easily, but in the second and third the Cleveland trotter Carroll was right at him at the finish and to many in the stand appeared to have won the final heat, but the judges saw it otherwise.

The 2:09 pace was won rather easily by the favorite, Walter Hal, making his second start of the week, with the Toledo pacer, Sir Milton, in second place. The 2:24 trot was a joke race and was won in straight heats and slow time.

The stable is all shipping out tonight for North Randall, O., where the Grand Circuit meeting opens, on Tuesday.

NEWARK TRADES FRILL.

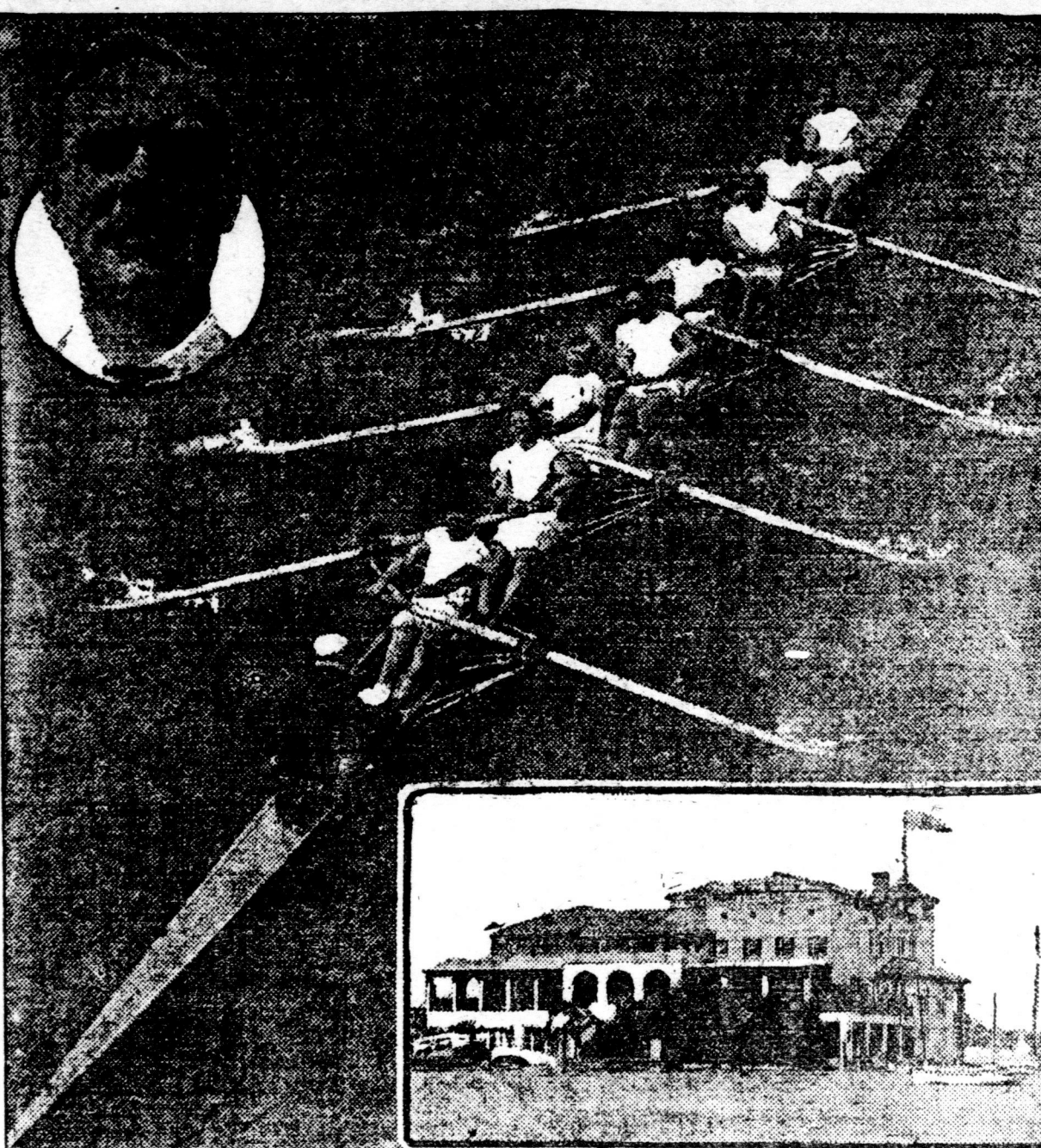

The Big Regatta Opens at Belle Isle Before Thousands.

ARGONAUTS WIN THE EIGHT-OARED

D. B. C. Second and Wyandotte Third—International Fours to Ottawa.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Detroit, Aug. 7.—By a splendid dash the New York Athletic Club's crew swept to the lead, Friday afternoon, and snatched victory out of seeming defeat in the international senior four-oared shells, the stellar race of the first day of the regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen.

River conditions were well-nigh perfect for the premier rowing event of America. The wind was light and steadily lessening. The water was quite smooth. The international was sixth on the programme, scheduled for 5 p.m. Eight entries were on the list, but the Winnipeg and the Toronto Dons were withdrawn, leaving Minnesota, Wabnetah, of Flushing, N. Y.; Vespers, of Philadelphia, N. Y. A. C.; Ottawa and Arundel.

Until the last quarter-mile the race was Ottawa's, with Wabnetah and Vesper fighting for second place. After one desperate spurt Minnesota was out of it, though they rowed yards, all their strength to the last 100 yards. Then the bow oar, Wright, dropped his grip, but renewed rowing a moment later. Substitute R. M. Newport, Jun., had R. M. Nelson's place at No. 2.

The Results.
