QUESTION OF A SITE FOR HIGH ST. CHURCH

The Matter Was Discussed at a Meeting Held Last Night.

The most important matter before the London Methodist Council at its annual meeting in Wesley Hall last night was the consideration of a site for the proposed new High Street Mission.

The High Street people wish to build on the corner of Methuen and Ridout streets, but at a previous meeting a resolution was passed holding the new church to a site south of Emery street and West avenue.

Mr. Thomas Spettigue and Mr. Miller, representing the High Street congregation, brought up the matter, asking for a reconsideration of the matter.

Askin Street Methodist Church board opposed any reconsideration. A vote was taken, and a majority were in favor of reconsideration, but not a two-thirds majority, which the Askin Street people claim is necessary to carry. It is probable that the High Street Church will be built on the site desired by its members.

Officers for the year were elected as follows: President, J. H. Chapman, re-elected; clerical vice-president, Rev. Dr. Manning; lay vice-president, Mr. John Watson; secretary, Israel Taylor, re-elected.

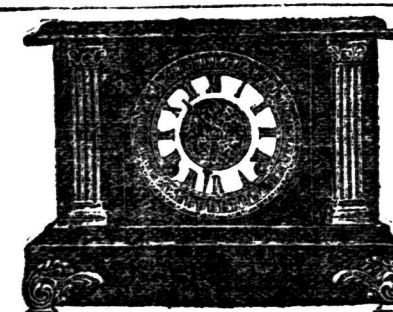

GET AWAY DAY AT THE CAMP

Citizen Soldiers Prepare to Leave for Their Homes.

ALL ARE WELL SATISFIED

All Signs Point to the Fact That the Camp Was a Big Success From Every Standpoint.

Today is breaking-up day at camp, and since morning the men have been busy packing up their belongings and getting in shape for going home. As quickly as they completed their arrangements the various companies marched to the depots, where special trains were in waiting to take them home. Special parties remained behind to take down the tents and pack them away, and attend to other duties that have to be looked after.

Men Were Satisfied. The men who are leaving for home today are a far more satisfied lot than those who left at the close of the camp last year. This is due to many things, but one of the principal reasons is the satisfactory efficiency pay they were enabled to make by means of the splendid instruction they were allowed at the ranges. Practically every man secured either first or second-class efficiency pay, and all are loud in their praise of the care and patience the officers devoted to them in their instruction. The officers on their side are well pleased with the results obtained, results which are a long way better than any ever accomplished before.

Efficient Shooting. The opinion is general that more has been done at this camp to solve the problem of efficient shooting than has been done in years of past training.

"If many of the fellows who stayed away on account of the trouble over efficiency pay last year, had known how we were going to be treated this year," said one soldier, "they would have come to train, and there would have been a good many more men in camp than there were. If the same rules are in force next year camp will be much better attended."

Officers state that in all the years they have been at camp the drill work was never more thoroughly done. "We never accomplished as much work as we have this year," said one officer. "This was due to the splendid system that prevailed. There was no lost time, and the men were doing something all the time."

The men themselves are well satisfied in this respect also, and feel that they have accomplished a good ten days' work. The candidate examination in equitation came before the board yesterday afternoon, and the results will be announced shortly. The examining board was composed of Lieut.-Col. McKenzie, Lieut.-Col. McEwen and Major Lamb, and those who were examined were Capt. H. W. Linton, of Hamilton; Lieut. J. C. Nolce, Capt. Dunlop, Lieut. Turnbull, Lieut. C. E. Sale, Lieut. F. W. Campbell and Lieut. P. W. Pike.

Probably there was never a more orderly camp held in London. Only three men appeared in the police court, and of these none were charged with drunkenness. The charges were all of being disorderly, and none were of a serious nature. The regulation prohibiting the sale of liquor in camp was strictly lived up to, and not a complaint came to the ears of any of the authorities that the law was being broken.
