DUEZ'S DEFALCATIONS STIRS ALL OF FRANCE

Jaures, Leader of the Socialists, Debates the Matter in the Deputies.

Paris, March 12.—The scandal grow-ing out of Duez's embezzlement of funds, obtained through the liquidation of religious congregations under the separation act, gains importance. Rumors of further revelations continue, and they received countenance in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon during a debate arising from interpellations put to the Government concerning Duez's defalcations. It has been a lon gtime since the chamber was so stirred. The House itself was full, the galleries were packed by eager crowds, which overflowed on the staircase and into the corridors, while the lobbies were almost impassable, and hundreds of persons on the street vainly tried to enter. M. Jaures, the socialist leader, de-

manded to know how Duez was able to carry on his frauds so long unchecked. The liquidation of the property of the congregations had been intrusted almost entirely to three men. The first of them was Duez, with whose frauds M. Jaures dealt with at length. 
