York streee. INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

104 Workmen Killed and 324 Injured During Month of October. [Canadlan Press.]

Nov. 14.-According to the Ottawa, record of industrial accidents maintained by the Department of Labor, there were 104 workmen killed and 324 injured during the month of October. Compared with the record for September, this is an increase of fifteen in the number killed and a decrease of 95 in the number injured. The greatest number of fatal accidents occurred in steam railway service, there being 28 employees killed. The building trades are next, with 15 fatalities.
