STREET LIGHTING WAS LAID OVER

Extension of Ornamental System Will Be Further Looked Into.

WEST LONDON BRIDGE

Matter Was Before No. 2 Committee Last Night, But Was Allowed to Remain Over.

The petition presented by the water commissioners for ornamental lighting on Dundas street, from Wellington to Egerton streets, was laid over by the board of works at its meeting last night.

General Manager Glaubitz submitted plans and specifications, with the request that definite action be taken at once. The members of the committee, however, thought that it would be better to allow the proposition to lay over until the street lighting rates are definitely settled.

"If the streets are lighted on one side only, it will make seven times the amount of light they have now," explained Chairman Robinson. "If both sides are lighted, it will mean fourteen times as much light. We had better allow the question to stand until the rates are finally settled."

This was agreeable to the rest of the committee. The death of Delaware, the old fire horse, was reported to the committee. For nearly twenty years Delaware was in the department, and did great service. However, old age got the better of him, and he was placed in the city engineer's department. He worked for a time there, but during the past year or so has been a pensioner. The other day he departed for the haven of rest set apart for horses. The death was fittingly referred to by the members of the committee.

The matter of obtaining the services of an expert to report on the West London breakwater was laid over until the next meeting.

"Perhaps when the West Londoners hear the opinion of the city solicitor they will not be anxious to improve the breakwater," said Ald. Robinson. "He informed me that the council could not make any permanent changes to the present embankment without a vote of the ratepayers, or by local improvement. We can add to the breakwater as it stands now, with the present construction, but nothing further."

Ald. Coles thought the whole city should bear the cost of the work, as it would be an improvement to the whole city. The matter will be dealt with as soon as Mr. Meredith's opinion is forwarded to the city council.

A New Church. The congregation of Latter Day Saints asked for special permission to construct a church on Main street. As nothing specific was mentioned, it was decided to lay the matter over until the congregation explained what special favors were required.

Mr. Sam Turner asked for damages for several chickens killed by dogs. His claim was filed.

Complaints were received regarding the switch being laid from the Pere Marquette tracks to the McClary Manufacturing Company. The matter was allowed to stand until City Engineer West returns.

West London Bridge. The council authorized the committee to call for tenders for the West London bridge, but nothing was done owing to the absence of the engineer in Halifax.
