A Tenant's Complaint.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: Today as I paid my rent I was told by my landlord that he would have to raise the rent for the house I live in one dollar a month, owing to the garbage tax, amounting to one dollar and sixty-eight cents a year. Now, can you or any of your readers inform me why, or should, my landlord charge me twelve dollars more a year because he has to pay one dollar and sixty-eight cents extra?

Last spring I paid two dollars to have the winter's ashes removed. Since that time a few tin cans have accumulated in my yard, which the garbage collector refuses to take away, as the regulation can is not provided to handle same, although a vessel just as suitable is on hand.

I am not aware of any man having the authority to say that kind of vessel shall be used to receive the household refuse for the purpose of transferring it to the collecting wagons.

I justly think if my landlord increases my rent as much as I have stated he should provide me with a garbage can that will meet the requirements of the collectors.

If you had space to spare, there are several other items which I would like to discuss relating to this garbage system, which seems to me very unjust, towards the poor and working people of this city. Yours respectfully,

REV. DR. THORNTON DEAD

Was Graduate of Knox College and Well Known in Canada.

A cable message from London received yesterday announced the sudden death of the Rev. Robert McAlpine Thornton, D. D., at his home in Notting Hill. This news will be learned with regret in Canada, where he had many friends. Dr. Thornton was from near Oshawa, the son of Rev. Robert H. Thornton, D. D., one of Canada's pioneer ministers, whose parish at one time extended for 60 or 70 miles along the north shore of Lake Ontario.

Dr. Thornton was a graduate of the University of Toronto, and received his theological training at Knox College, with post-graduate sessions at Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Berlin. He was licensed in Edinburgh.

Dr. Thornton's first pastorate was in Knox Church, Montreal, and afterwards in Glasgow. In 1874 he was called to "Camden Park" (English Presbyterian), London, and was there for 29 years, until his retirement from active work two years ago. Since that time he has been doing service for the church of a less public kind, an honor which was a delegate to the Pan-Presbyterian Council at Aberdeen. From his own congregation Dr. Thornton received many tokens of love and appreciation. His Alma Mater, Knox College, bestowed on him the degree of doctor of divinity, and the church at large showed its confidence and regard by calling him to the moderatorial chair.

Dr. Thornton leaves a widow, a daughter, the late Rev. Dr. Buchanan, of Glasgow, four sons and two daughters, Mrs. John Gilechrist and Miss Thornton, Brunswick avenue, and Mrs. John Gowans, St. George street, are sisters.

FOUND DEAD

James Henderson Died While Asleep at Home in Ingersoll.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ingersoll, July 21.—James Henderson, 78 years of age, was found dead in bed this morning at the home of his son, John A. Henderson, Wenhams street. He had been ill for a week, and his death was ascribed to heart failure. Panama, July 21.—Col. G. W. Goethals, chief engineer in charge of the construction of the Panama Canal, has notified Lieut.-Col. David Du B. Gaillard, chief of the central division of the canal, that steam shovel work for the Culebra Cut section will hereafter be conducted on the assumption that Gamboa dike will be dynamited Oct. 10. While it had previously been announced that this dynamiting would take place after Oct. 1, this is the first time the actual date has been named. The destruction of the dike will allow Gatun Lake to flood the cut.

RUSHING THE BUILDING OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Repair Work and Extensions Will Be Finished by September 1.

Trustee E. R. Dennis, chairman of the board of education, and Trustee A. M. Hunt, chairman No. 2 committee, made a visit of inspection on Saturday afternoon to the different schools in course of erection throughout the city, and were well pleased with the progress that is being made. At Chesley avenue the work is being pushed rapidly in order to have at least the old part ready for the fall term. The addition will add greatly to this school, and as provision is being made for domestic science and manual training it will do away with the necessity of the children crossing the railway tracks, which has proved dangerous in the past.

At Aberdeen school everything is going on with a rush. This will be one of the finest schools in the province when completed, a school that the citizens of London may well be proud of. Talbot street school the boilers have been placed, and the work is being pushed as fast as possible, and will be ready for the fall term. The painting at the different schools is being done as fast as possible, and everything will be in first-class condition for the opening of the fall term.

Catholic Party Is Not Yet Necessary

Will Be Formed If Present Political Parties Enroach.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, July 21.—L'Action Sociale, of Quebec, while denying the immediate intention of founding a Catholic party, says that if a Catholic party is ever founded in this Province outside of the existing parties or in opposition to them, it will be the parties themselves, either by their hostility or their inaction, which will have rendered necessary this party, which will be Catholic before being politically partisan.

Here as elsewhere a Catholic party will be formed on political grounds the day the so-called political parties forget and sacrifice the rights and interests of the Church and of Catholic conscience. When politics enroach upon Catholics' ground it will then be necessary for Catholics to organize in order to resist these encroachments, even in the political camp, which belongs to them as well as to all other citizens.

L'Action Sociale admits that this organization will be attended by inconveniences, but these are less harmful than the evil which such organization is called upon to combat.

"The organization of a political party," concludes L'Action Sociale, "is not yet considered necessary in this Province, but it is necessary, and what will always be necessary, is the maintenance and at the proper time, a better organization of God's great party."

Pope's Guardsmen Threaten To Strike

Submit List of Grievances to Cardinal Merry del Val.

[Canadian Press.] Rome, July 21.—The mutinous Swiss guardsmen at the Vatican today presented to Cardinal Merry del Val, royal secretary of state, a memorial relating their grievances and setting forth the conditions on which they are disposed to remain in the service. Otherwise, they declare, they are ready to leave. The conditions are as follows:

1. The dismissal of the commander of the Swiss guards.
2. An increase in the number of the Swiss guards from 80 to 100.
3. The commander and all the officers to be chosen from among themselves.

4. The abolition of the prohibition against the guards frequenting stores on the right bank of the Tiber, and the granting of permission to frequent wine shops.

5. A return to the original system of military instruction, with the abolition of bayonet drill, target shooting, and the climbing of roofs to protect the Vatican from imaginary assaults.

6. No punishments to be inflicted in connection with the present agitation. Cardinal Merry del Val afterwards conferred for a long time with the Pope in an endeavor to find a satisfactory solution of the incident.

Japs Influencing Western Canada

Montreal, July 21.—That Eastern Canada is unconsciously being influenced by the Japanese, and if it fails to Christianize them, it might be that they would do something towards paganism, was the statement made on Sunday by the Rev. Dr. Coats, of Tokio, who addressed a large congregation in St. James' Methodist Church. Unhappily, he said, the messages that the missionaries gave forth from their pulpits was largely neutralized in the east by the lives of westerners, who were classified as Christians. One feature of American and European life which very much impressed the Japanese, was the home life, but on the other hand western civilization was not being accepted by them as an unmodified good.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

Heavy Damage Was Done by Storm at Saskatoon.

[Canadian Press.] Saskatoon, July 21.—This city was visited by a severe electrical storm last night. The lightning in many parts of the city were put out, and the lightning tore up a section of pavement on First avenue. Mayor Harris' house was struck and caught fire, but the brigade extinguished the blaze before much damage resulted.

Two Englishwomen, Miss Weston and Miss Wintz, according to The Queen, last year sent to English sailors 822,000 copies of a monthly magazine, "Ashore and Afloat," and nearly 500,000 copies of a printed monthly letter. 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BOMB OUTRAGES
Many Tenement Dwellers in New York Terrorized.
[Canadian Press.] New York, July 21.—Four bomb explosions during the past 24 hours left the tenement dwellers of New York today in a state of terror. In each case the outrage followed written demands for money. The explosions last night drove several hundred persons into the streets and caused considerable damage to property, but all the occupants of the buildings where the bombs were planted escaped without serious injury.
