NO. 1 SIGNAL COMPANY
IS RAPIDLY FILLING UP

The regular weekly parade of No. 1 company, Canadian Signal Corps, commanded by Major M. L. Maitland, M.C., was held in the Armories last night. Owing to the repairs being made to the Armories' floor, it was impossible to adhere to the syllabus of training as laid down for the evening. However, good progress was made in instructing the new recruits in the rudiments of signalling. The more experienced men employed their time at telegraph and telephone work on the new system recently installed in the building. The company, the ranks of which became somewhat depleted during the summer months, is rapidly filling up with the desired class of recruits and it is expected that the unit will be at full strength within a fortnight. Instruction in wireless work for the more advanced signallers has been unavoidably delayed. A provisional wireless set is being made ready and as soon as this is completed and installed a new class will be formed. The out-of-town sections of the unit in Ingersoll, Chatham, St. Thomas and Goderich have also commenced fall training. The Ingersoll and Goderich sections are up to strength, while the other two have a few vacancies. Major Maitland inspected the Ingersoll section last week and was favorably impressed with the smartness of the men.

SANSONE TO SERVE TERM AT BURWASH

Provincial Secretary To Make Special Provision For Him.

Sylvia Sansone, now a prisoner in the county jail, will be sent to Burwash to serve his term of not less than two years and not more than five years for a robbery of which he was convicted in June, Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop, K.C., stated today. Inspector of Prisons W. W. Dunlop went into this matter thoroughly when he was here in connection with the recent investigation into the escape of the Murrell brothers, and as a result the provincial secretary has decided to send the youthful prisoner to the prison farm. This is being done under a special ruling that the provincial secretary may transfer a prisoner from one institution to another if such action is warranted. Since June, when he was sentenced, Sansone has been in the county jail, but is not desired there because of his misbehavior. He could not be sent to Kingston because of his age and St. John's Industrial School authorities refused to take him, saying that he could not be controlled by them. He could not be sent to Burwash until a special order was made, as his term was too long.

SHOT THROUGH ARM AT STRATHROY FAIR

STRATHROY, Sept. 21.—Andrew Boulton of Adelaide Township was shot through the left arm late yesterday afternoon at the fair grounds here. Mr. Boulton was standing beside a shooting gallery and had stooped to examine an automobile tire, when a stray shot fired by a "poor" shot caught him in the arm. Mr. Boulton was rushed to the General Hospital, where the 22-calibre bullet was removed. Today he was reported as being greatly improved. Provincial Officer Palmer of London notified the man in charge of the shooting gallery that he would have to make several alterations to his outfit, which was immediately done.

LATE ELIZABETH SCATES CAME FROM LONDON TP.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 21.—The death took place today of two of Woodstock's oldest residents, Mrs. Mary Ann Tunks and Mrs. Elizabeth Scates. The combined ages of the two pioneers was 165 years. Mrs. Tunks was 84 years of age and came to this country from England when five years of age, and has lived in this part of the country ever since. Five daughters and three sons survive. Mrs. Elizabeth Scates was 81 years of age and was born in London Township, Middlesex County. She came to this city from Appin with her husband, who alone survives her.

Clubs Forty Jobless Men As They Are Seeking Food.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Thousands of persons in the vicinity of Bryant Park witnessed an attack yesterday by a police force on 40 hungry and jobless men, who had gathered about six elderly women distributing sandwiches. Bystanders who saw the police attack hundreds of unemployed men the other day as they entered the park for the proposed "auction sale" of jobless men and women by Urban Lehoux, declared the assault was even less justified and more violent. The policeman is said to have felled at least a dozen of the men with his club and to have beaten others across the back and legs while they sought safety in flight.

Bruce Liberals See Hot-test Campaign in Many Years.

WALKERTON, Sept. 21.—A convention of the Liberals of South Bruce will be held in the town hall here on Monday next for the purpose of reorganizing and to nominate a candidate to contest the riding in the approaching federal election. In the Liberal ranks here there is great enthusiasm. It is stated by veteran Liberals that not since the general elections of 1896 when the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier was returned prime minister, has there been displayed so much interest concerning an election. A large delegation is expected to go from here for the convention.

BIG LUMBER MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Six Million Feet of Timber Burned At Parry Sound.

PARRY SOUND, Sept. 21.—Fire today destroyed the mill and lumber stocks of the Conger Lumber Company here, as well as a large number of boats, canoes and bathhouses along the waterfront. For a time the town itself was threatened with destruction, but the wind that blew from the southeast aided the firefighters, and as the fire is dying down tonight, it is believed the danger has been averted. Besides the mill and machinery, the loss includes 6,000,000 feet of lumber, 4,000,000 pieces of lath, piles, slabs or other mill products, as well as several company's barns and stables, dwelling-house, tramway and railway spur line. A large number of boats and canoes which had been stored here for the winter by private parties were burned. A. W. Daball's boat livery and repair works were destroyed. About half of the lumber was owned by Messrs. Pratt & Shaumason of Midland. The extent of the loss, which has not yet been estimated, is partly covered by insurance. About 80 men will be thrown out of employment.

THREE-CORNERED FIGHT LIKELY IN OXFORD

Day, Liberal, already in the field for the Legislature by-election, there is talk of two more candidates. The Conservatives will meet, and it is almost sure they will nominate a candidate. The names of John Sisco, president of the association, and H. B. Neely of this city, are being freely mentioned as prospective candidates in the event of the Conservatives putting a man in the field. It is likely that the Liberal party will also decide to enter the fight, making a quartet of candidates in the field.

FAST RACES FEATURE OF STRATHROY FAIR

Four Close Finishes Kept the Crowd of Ten Thousand On Its Toes.

STRATHROY, Sept. 21.—Old Sol, who flirled all morning with the directors of the Strathroy Fair, decided he would stay for the afternoon, and consequently 10,000 people swarmed the grounds and grandstand on the last day of the fair, which was voted the best show ever held. The parade of live stock winners before the grandstand proved to be one of the features today, the prize horses being heartily applauded as they swept past with arched necks.

Finishes Were Close.
Owing to wet weather yesterday, all four speed events were run off this afternoon, and those who came to see some real races were amply rewarded. Close finishes being in order. The local race, with a purse of \$150, attracted eight entries and provided a merry chase. Belgo, owned by Harry Headley of Denfield, won in three straight heats, with Tomeco, owned by J. Mackey of Strathroy, second. J. Mackey and concession men did a roaring business. Provincial Officers Palmer and Gale kept a close watch on their proceedings, and no flim-flam games were noted.
