DOROTHY DALTON STARS AS CROOK

Drama of Thieves in Paris and Normandy Appears At Loew's

VAUDEVILLE GOOD

Dramas of crook life laid on our own continent are usually engrossing. They are more so when their stage is set in Paris and Normandy, and an Austrian criminal and his beautiful daughter hold the center as in "The Moral Sinner." One of the most interesting things in which Dorothy Dalton has yet appeared, the picture is feature of the current bill at Loew's, and in addition to first-class vaudeville, makes an excellent program.

By the apparently simple expedient of always appearing as the figure of an interesting story, and by maintaining her part of the bargain with unvarying good work, Dorothy Dalton has kept to the front rank of film stars.

Her pictures are always of a calibre sufficiently strong to draw out the most ordinary vicissitudes. The story of "The Moral Sinner" is that of a beautiful woman who was a thief. She became a thief, because she was the daughter of a criminal, and because it seemed the line of least resistance, and also because her father was always cleverly touched up for her by a ring of Robin Hood romance. With the entrance of love, however, and the attendant dramatic incidents, Leah Kleschna's penchant for dark nights and safe doors is abruptly terminated. Happiness follows her as far as Normandy, once the thief is driven out, and with a fluttering peasant bonnet vanishing down a beautiful winding road, one realizes that a lovely story has come to an end. Adequate direction, settings and supporting cast supply all the details necessary to a first-class picture.

The Hard Employer.

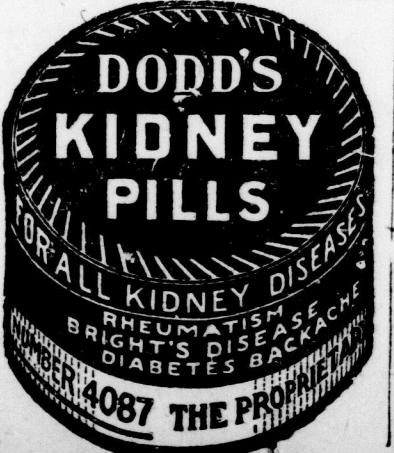

CHANGE COSTS JAM FIRM TWENTY MILLION DOLLARS

\$100,000 IS STILL DUE TO METHODIST PASTORS

Superannuation Fund Secretary Predicts Shortage in Salary Requirements.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Toronto, June 16.—There is still \$100,000 due to Methodist ministers in Canada on last year's salaries, Rev. R. J. D. Simpson, secretary of the superannuation fund, announced at today's session of the Toronto Methodist conference. He predicted that there would be a big shortage of funds to meet the salary requirements again this year. Nevertheless, Simpson condemned any efforts to save us from a commercial ministry, he declared, and indicated that just as soon as a minister started to sell real estate it was time to leave the ministry, for men who entered the ministry should give their life to the church. He thought there should be some plan to carry ministers over the period when they had not regular preaching stations so that they would not have to enter commercial pursuits.

BRITISH AND ITALIAN BALLOONS LAND IN FRANCE

Dieppe, France, June 16.—The British balloon Margaret, piloted by Spencer, in the Gordon Bennett cup race, landed this evening a few miles south of here. All on her are safe.

Fecamp, France, June 16.—The Italian balloon Crampino, a competitor in the Gordon Bennett cup race, piloted by Major Joseph Valle, landed safely at 3:35 o'clock this afternoon at Thieville, near here. The balloon had travelled a little over 300 kilometres.

BILL TO STOP EVICTION OF TENANTS RESTORED

House of Commons Rejects Amendments Proposed by Lords.

London, June 16.—The House of Commons tonight, after debating the government bill for prevention of the eviction of tenants who do not pay their rent because of unemployment, rejected all the amendments proposed by the House of Lords. The government was aided by the Liberal vote, and the bill, restored to its original condition, will go back to the House of Lords, which may either persist in the amendments or accept the decision of the House of Commons. In a subsequent debate on a measure dealing with street traffic,

the government sustained an adverse vote, which, however, had no political significance. The Labor government will still be in power in the fall, in the opinion of Premier MacDonald. He declared in the House of Commons today that he was perfectly certain that the November session would be reached without a general election.

QUEBEC MAN IS KILLED IN 12-FOOT AUTO PLUNGE

Coaticook, Que., June 16.—Fred Bouffard, 20, of Compton, was instantly killed on Saturday night about midnight, and J. Vallancourt suffered fractures of both legs, when their automobile went through the iron railing and over a 12-foot cement pier on the Sherbrooke highway about a mile and a half from here.
