

ALLIANCE CONDEMNS SYSTEM OF LIQUOR CONTROL

LONDON PASTORS PASS RESOLUTION CONDEMNING STEP

See No Chance To Halt Illicit Trade With Government Control.

POINT TO WEST

The London Ministerial Alliance does not share with those who would bring a system of government sale in this province the optimism that it would do away with bootlegging, blind pigs and similar institutions. A resolution unanimously adopted by the body at their meeting this morning points to the conditions in British Columbia as an evidence that these things continue in spite of such enactment, and it was stated by Rev. Dr. Wm. Beattie, who presented the resolution, that they were in a more flourishing condition than while prohibition had been in force.

"I have it on reliable authority," Dr. Beattie said, "that conditions in British Columbia are such at the present time that another year of such will be sufficient to bring about a repeal of the act providing for government control."

The sentiment is aroused, not only of prohibitionists, but of hard-headed businessmen, who are realizing the great decrease in efficiency, and they are organizing themselves to have government control abandoned.

Approve Resolution.

The resolution approved by the alliance, omitting the address to the premier, the attorney-general and the member for London, reads: "Would express its firm conviction that, notwithstanding manifest difficulties in the enforcement of prohibition in this province, where the manufacture of alcoholic liquors is permitted, the drunkenness, in crime traceable to drunkenness and in poverty due to the same cause, amply justifies the continuance of the Ontario temperance act; the members of the association are unanimously agreed that every effort should be put forth by those in authority to secure the act wherein it may be weak and to insure a more adequate enforcement; that association feels that in a reform involving such radical but beneficial changes in the habits of the people, stability should characterize the policy of the government and that to the end the present act should be given a considerably longer period of fair trial."

"We are unanimous in our conviction that the present acknowledged evils cannot be cured by any system of government sale. It is a matter of well-attested fact that bootlegging, club-drinking and blind pigs thrive in British Columbia and Quebec under government sale to a greater degree and in more pernicious form than at any time during prohibition."

Promise Support.

The alliance were approached this morning by a committee of the Welfare Society and promised to lend every support to its budget campaign. City pulpits are expected to be opened on a special Sunday for a speaker from the committee in charge.

Keen regret was expressed that the alliance is the one of its most valued members in the person of Rev. Matthew Kelly, pastor of the First Congregational Church, who leaves at the end of the month for Indiana. The vote of appreciation moved by Dr. McGregor and seconded by Rev. John Hosie, provided that a copy should be sent to Mr. Kelly's new charge, as evidence of the service he has rendered to the community and to his own congregation. Mr. Kelly has been one of the most active workers of the Ministerial Alliance, and has taken a very prominent part in the social service work of the city.

The speaker of the morning was Rev. Professor Anderson of Huron College, whose subject was "The Prevalent Belief in Demons Noticed Among the Early Christian Fathers." It was one of unique interest, in that the question is not commonly discussed, and it precipitated a great deal of interesting argument.

BROTHERHOOD WILL AID WELFARE FUND WORK

Members of District Federation To Issue Appeal From Churches.

The London District Brotherhood Federation, at their meeting Friday night, received the report of the secretary that permission had been given to hold meetings in the Manor and Highland Parks and decided to have the first meeting there on Sunday afternoon, March 30.

The request of the Welfare Fund committee for speakers to aid in presenting their appeal in the churches of the city, was granted and Brotherhood men will give short addresses where required on Sunday March 30.

Arrangements for the great men's rally in the auditorium of the Central Collegiate on Sunday, March 23, in the interests of world's peace, were decided upon. Besides the main address by Professor Dorland of the University of Western Ontario, there will be short speeches from representatives of the Roman Catholic, Anglican and other churches, and the various men's clubs of the city.

LIQUOR MARINERS FEAR PHANTOM GRAY SHIP

Cruiser Pounces On Defenceless Traffickers, So Yarn Goes.

New York, March 17.—Liquor mariners, who were formerly shoremen and wielders of the lobster net, tell with bated breath the story of a phantom gray cruiser which has haunted the waters of Long Island during the past three weeks, pouncing upon the defenceless rum traffickers as they were bound to "rum run" from one harbor to another. The phantom is a 54-foot Great Lakes cruiser, with a speed of 55 miles, and is equipped with what is reputed to be two 250-horsepower engines. Twenty-two crewmembers comprise the crew, all armed with pistols.

CONDITIONS ARE IMPOSED FOR KING'S ABDUCTION

Athens, March 17.—A semi-official statement confirms newspaper reports that an agreement has been reached among the political leaders, prescribing the conditions under which King George will be allowed to abdicate voluntarily.

These include the right to retain the title of king for life, power to draw four-fifths of civil list allowance, the right to dispose freely of the crown domains excepting the Patro Palace which the state will buy, and renunciation of the rights of succession by all the members of the dynasty.

The government has transmitted the conditions to the Greek minister at Bucharest, for transmission to George, who is in exile there.

SECURE FARM WORK.

A number were found on farms by the employment bureau today for one month's trial. Mr. Spencer in charge stated that with the total disappearance of snow he looks for people to be pursued, but believed that the present conditions will give employment to quite a number.

MILITIA OFFICIALS DENY PRIVILEGE OF CHANGING LAW

Mayor Advised Law Concerning Uniform Wearing Must Stand.

RECENT ORDER STRESSED

The Ottawa militia authorities advise that they can do nothing with respect to Mayor Wenig's request to exempt certain returned soldiers from the order, effective March 31, that uniforms must be worn only upon certain occasions, specified by the department.

Mayor Wenig wired Ottawa Saturday, notifying the authorities there that many ex-soldiers were compelled to wear their uniforms or portions thereof by reason of unfortunate circumstances.

The following wire has been received by the mayor from the deputy-minister of the interior, which stresses, in effect, the recent order, which becomes effective in two weeks.

Mayor Wenig.

"Regarding the unauthorized wearing of uniforms, intended to draw attention to amendment to the criminal code which was passed four years ago. Department has no power to alter or amend provisions of the criminal code, and persons violating same are liable to prosecution by civil authorities. Just as much as they would be if any other offense under the code was committed."

The mayor is seeking further information. He states that he admits that the criminal code forbids the wearing of uniforms except upon formal occasions prescribed by the military authorities but feels that exemptions could be authorized for emergencies.

HYDRO QUESTION TO BE DEBATED

Sir Adam Beck Is Expected To Outline Program in the House Tomorrow.

Toronto, March 17.—Hydro matters will be debated in the Ontario Legislature tomorrow, when the estimates for that purpose are considered. Sir Adam Beck will outline the proposed program for the year and report on the work accomplished during the past twelve months. It is unlikely that he will devote much time to the report of the Gregory commission.

Tonight the public accounts committee will meet to hear evidence from the managers of the banks in which Douglas K. Ridout's \$100,000 profit on the sale of \$10,000,000 treasury bills was made. There will be a night session of the house. It is generally believed that the legislature will conclude its session in about three weeks, although the committees have most of their work to do yet. The work of the house proper is ahead of the committees.

EXPERTS WILL TESTIFY FOR DELORME TODAY

Counsel Have Yet To Decide Whether or Not Addresses Will Be Waived.

Montreal, March 17.—Delormes this morning were that, contrary to expectations, defence expert evidence would occupy a large part of today's proceedings. RUSSIAN PRESS PRAISES SOVIET-CHINESE PACT

Moscow, March 17.—The Russian newspaper consider the Russo-Chinese rapprochement a great feat of soviet diplomacy, and as significant of the future liberation of the Chinese from foreign control.

The Workers' Gazette points out that the pact is a great step towards the resumption of relations with Soviet Russia, and suggests that the Chinese agreement is equally important.

"Izvestia," the official newspaper, says Russia now becomes a serious factor in the future relationships on the Pacific Ocean, which is rapidly becoming an international arena. "Establishment of full relations between New China and the greatest world power, the soviet federation, represents the beginning of a new historical process," it declares.

MAY AIR DISPUTE.

The roofing dispute between City Engineer Neer and Arthur Mould, contractor, may be aired again at Tuesday's session of the board of works. The engineer stated that he did not know just what course would be pursued, but believed that he would introduce the question for final settlement at the committee, should he hear from Mr. Mould again.



LUNCH COUNTER CARS ON C. N. R.

Lunch counter cars which will care for the needs of passengers in the colonist, first class and tourist cars of the main line trains who do not desire to use the regular dining cars are being operated by the Canadian National railways for the convenience of the travelling public, and particularly of immigrants arriving in Canada. As an experiment, lunch counter cars have been placed in service between Winnipeg and Toronto.

ARMEN START WORLD FLIGHT

Three U. S. Cruisers Leave Santa Monica on First Leg of Journey.

Cloverfield, Santa Monica, Cal., March 17.—The United States army flight around the world started today at 9:22 a.m.

The three air cruisers circle around Cloverfield for altitude as a large crowd waved farewell. They flew in formation with Major Frederick L. Martin to the front.

The three cruisers flew over the northern edge of the field, headed for Sacramento, their first stop at 9:40 o'clock. Lieut.-Col. Wm. E. Gilmore, air officer of the Ninth Corps area, led seventeen aeroplanes from Crissy Field, San Francisco, as escort to the world fliers.

GEN. PELLE, FORMER WAR LEADER, PASSES

Noted Soldier Was Honored the Day Before His Death in Toulou, France.

Toulou, March 17.—General Pelle, former French high commissioner at Constantinople, died yesterday. General Pelle had only recently returned to France after a long sojourn in Czechoslovakia, where he was chief of the French mission.

The French government in appreciation of his services, conferred upon him Saturday the grand cross of the Legion of Honor.

General M. C. J. Pelle during the war was chief of staff to Marshal Joffre. In 1920 he was appointed high commissioner to Constantinople where he treated with the Turks in an endeavor to bring about harmony between them and the allies and to bring about a cessation of hostilities between the Turks and Greeks.

J. V. HOOKE DIES IN CITY AFTER ILLNESS OF WEEK

After an illness of one week the death occurred at his residence, 12 Hyla street, yesterday of J. V. Hooke, 57th year. Mr. Hooke was born in England, and had lived in London for the past eleven years. He was a member of the Ealing school, he was at one time a member of Cronyn Memorial Church choir.

He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Miss Hilda Hooke, who is in the board of education offices. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon from his residence to the Ealing Memorial Church, where services will be conducted by Rev. Quinton Warner. Inspector V. K. Greer and G. A. Wheable will attend the funeral. Interment will be made in Woodland Cemetery.

NAPOLEONIC RELICS ARE TO BE SOLD BY AUCTION

Paris, March 17.—The nightshirt Napoleon wore on his deathbed, the pillow on which he took his last drink, a piece of his coffin, a fragment of the railing of the tomb and earth from the grave are to be sold shortly at auction.

The relics were brought by Archambault, Napoleon's faithful groom from St. Helena. Archambault, with one or two personal servants, shared his life with Napoleon, but circumstances now oblige the descendants to dispose of them.

At present the relics are on exhibition in the mansion, Napoleon's country house near Paris, when he was first consul, now converted into a Napoleonic museum.

GERMAN PROFESSOR ARRESTED

Berlin, March 17.—The German pacifist leader, Professor F. L. Quide, of the University of Munich, has been arrested in Munich by order of the public prosecutor in connection with a letter he is alleged to have sent Gen. von Seeckt, commander of the Reichswehr. The letter is charged, contained the statement that young men were receiving military training throughout Germany under Reichswehr supervision.

BUSINESSMEN ARE URGED TO HELP IMMIGRATION DEPT.

John Farrell, Local Inspector, Addresses the Rotary Club.

LAND NEEDS WORKERS

When the continental railways of Canada were built, it was by men who were expecting a population of fifty millions, and not one of eight million. John Farrell, immigration inspector, told to the Rotary Club today, in an address on immigration, that the immigration department of a greater number of reliable farm laborers. Immigration has been treated from a national and an international aspect by many speakers at the club. Mr. Farrell treated it from a more intimate standpoint, pointing out the individual responsibility of every business man in the city.

"We are going to make a greater and better London," he said, "by building up the country around here. Why are there thousands and thousands of uncultivated acres outside London. Is it because there are not sufficient men here to work them?"

Immigrants come here pledged to become agriculturists, sometimes merely as a pretence to get into the country. Once here, they strive to get into the cities. Businessmen can co-operate with the immigration department in preventing this. They can demand an official order from every man who applies to them for work. By so doing, no injustice is done to the newcomer, but the immigration department can make sure that for a time at least, he serves that purpose for which he is allowed to come into the country and enjoy its privileges.

"What Canada needs is wealth and the wealth is waiting in the soil. But it is not only the government, but it is for men to work in the fields. We don't need to exaggerate to have immigrants, but we need men to work the land. The climate and the produce speak for themselves—but we must have men to work the land."

SHAREHOLDERS SEE NO HOPE THROUGH NEWEST CLAIM

U. A. Buchner Discounts the Windsor Man's Chance of Success in Suit.

A CHARTERED BANK

Notwithstanding attempts of John D. Anderson of Windsor to fight the double liability clause in the bank act, local Home Bank shareholders say there is no chance of being relieved of the burden.

"Shareholders have until May 1 to make their returns," U. A. Buchner, Home Bank inspector, who is a shareholder himself, said: "There are not a dozen shareholders in Canada who have claims which can be termed legitimate."

Mr. Buchner added that an understanding of the Home Bank situation will not be broadcasted until next Thursday, when Judge McKeon, who is investigating affairs at Ottawa, makes a preliminary report.

"Mr. Anderson of Windsor claims the Home Bank was not a chartered bank, but his idea, so far as I can see, is all wrong. There was never any question of doubt regarding the transfer of the Home Savings and Loan Company to the Home Bank. The Home Bank is included in the list of this country's chartered banks."

The case of local Catholics and Catholic institutions against the Home Bank will come up shortly. It is claimed that when a substantial deposit of funds made by Bishop Fallon was accepted on the day of the Home Bank's suspension, it was past closing time. On these grounds the bishop is bringing the case to court. The amount involved is said to total as high as \$30,000.

REPAIR WORK COMMENCES ON VICTORIA NURSES' HOME

Work was started this morning on repairing the nurses' quarters at Victoria Hospital damaged by fire a few weeks ago. The work is being undertaken by staff carpenters, and although only four men are at present on the job, more will be added, according to Dr. Clegg, superintendent. It is expected that all repairs will be completed within a month.

AUXILIARY AIR FORCE IS GOVERNMENT AIM

MacDonald Party Would Base Principle on Territorial Army

London, March 17.—With a view to developing the home air defence along lines laid down by the late Baldwin government, a bill is being sponsored in the House of Commons by the MacDonald government providing for an auxiliary air force based on the territorial army. The bill authorizes the formation of county associations the members of which will undertake the responsibility of home defence duties in the event of an attack on the United Kingdom. The officers of these associations will carry on training each year.

OIL COMPANY'S BOOKS ARE SUBJECT TO CLOSE PROBE

Vera Cruz, March 17.—Upon the publication of official charges in Mexico City against the Mexican Eagle Oil Company (El Aguila) that this company had rendered aid to the revolutionists, federal inspectors are investigating the company's accounts. They announce the disappearance of 8,000 cubic meters of oil, which are not accounted for, and other alleged irregularities. The report of the investigators has been sent to the authorities in Mexico City.

NORTH SYDNEY DAILY HAS SUSPENDED PUBLICATION

North Sydney, N.S., March 17.—The North Sydney Daily Herald suspended publication Saturday after a career of three years and seven months. Business depression during the last two years, due to continued labor troubles and other local conditions, are given as the cause for suspension. The weekly edition of the Herald, which has been published for many years, will be continued.

TWENTY-TWO INJURED IN ITALIAN EXPLOSION

Turin, Italy, March 17.—Twenty-two persons were buried in the debris of a match factory where an explosion occurred yesterday. Seven of them were removed later, seriously injured. The others have not yet been rescued.
