AREA COMMISSION WOULD QUIT WORK

Members of Industrial Area Body Want Support of Council.

Opinion was expressed at a meeting of the industrial area commission yesterday that the body had been lost sight of by the council that had appointed it, and that it might as well cease to function. Chairman Mel Cater suggested that the commissioners had in their resignations to the council. It was decided to ask for support from the council before carrying on further.

Lockjaw Proves Fatal To Horse

A horse belonging to E. Price, 111 King street, stepped on a nail while walking on a city street yesterday afternoon. The nail pierced the frog of the hoof to the quick, and within a few hours the horse had contracted lockjaw and had to be shot.

Inspector George Tustin of the humane society was called by Mr. Price. Before Mr. Tustin arrived the animal had kicked most of his stall down and was in such agony that it had to be shot immediately.

This is the third case of this kind that Mr. Tustin has handled in the five years in which he has been connected with the humane society.

REDUCTION IN TAX ON INCOMES ASKED

Ontario Association Gives Undivided Support To Resolution Urging Cut.

DISCUSS CURRENCY

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Nov. 21. — Imperial preference and the restoration of gold currency were the principal subjects under consideration today by the Ontario associated boards of trade and chambers of commerce at the closing sessions of the eleventh annual meeting. Both subjects brought about strong division among the delegates, but there was practical unanimity in a resolution fostered by the Hamilton chamber of commerce and the Toronto board of trade, calling for a reduction in income tax.

Matters of less importance, such as compulsory automobile insurance, a resolution pertaining to which was withdrawn and an embargo on pulpwood, occupied the attention of the gathering during the day.

At the close of the business session officers were elected and installed, J. G. Elliott of Kingston being the new president.

Debate Preference.

Col. W. N. Ponton of Belleville sponsored a resolution, calling for a "generous system of preference" to foster and encourage inter-imperial trade. It almost immediately met with strong opposition, several of the manufacturers contending that Canadian preference and asked why Canada should lie down under the high tariff walls which foreign countries had built against it.

"Are we afraid of being great?" he

inquired. "Let us link up with the motherland and try to make the empire an economic unit."

Sir James Woods of Toronto, in opposing the resolution, said he took second place to no one in his admiration for Britain, but things had changed. If they passed the resolution the government would take it that the association agreed with increasing the imperial preference, whereas, it was doing harm.

He introduced an amendment which stated that preferences should be based on the principle of exchange with due regard to differences in wages. He was supported by W. F. Cocksbutt, of Brantford, who second-

ed the amendment and declared that Canada was losing hundreds of thousands of dollars through mills being closed down on account of the British preference. The amendment was endorsed by the gathering.

Name Committee.

To consider the question of an embargo on pulpwood, the following committee was appointed: Lieut.-Col. W. Simpson, Guelph; K. G. Dunston, Toronto; C. T. Young, Toronto; P. K. Elliott, Iroquois Falls, and G. S. Matthews of Brantford.

With the object of forming the Ontario tourists' association, in accordance with a resolution previously passed, a committee was appointed as under: Russell T. Kellogg, Hamilton; Dr. P. E. Doolittle, Toronto; O. G. Smith, Orillia; G. S. Matthews, Brantford; C. Bethune, Ottawa; J. P. Beatty, Toronto, and Leon Frazer, Peterboro.

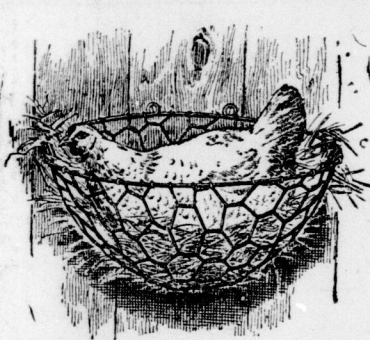
In order to protect 15 Canadian shipyards with an invested capital of \$50,000,000, the dominion government was urged to take such action in respect of repairs made or equipment

purchased in a foreign port for any Canadian registered vessel as would accord the same treatment as the country of such foreign port extended to repairs made or equipment purchased in Canada. Opinion was divided on the wisdom of Canada, seeking to restore gold currency at the present time, and the matter was referred to the executive committee.

A resolution was passed urging the Ontario government to take measures to prevent the exportation of raw material from any public domain.

In the evening the delegates were the guests of the Toronto board of trade at a banquet. Hon. Charles McCrea, minister of mines, spoke briefly.

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
