#### QUEBEC BY-ELECTIONS

The utter hopelessness of the conservatives in the province of Quebec is exemplified again in the three provincial by-elections which took place on Friday. The O'Brien administration is liberal. The regular opposition is conservative. But in addition to the regular opposition there is a very small party composed of nationalists, led by Mr. Bourassa, and assisted by Hon. Mr. Brousselle. The latter was a member of the Gouin government until a comparatively short time ago, and he was compelled to leave it because of attacks made by Mr. Bourassa on the way he managed his department. Almost immediately on re-joining the government Mr. Brousselle went into active opposition, joining Mr. Bourassa, who had brought about his political downfall, and violently assailing his late colleagues. This was the condition of affairs when it became necessary to fill three vacant seats—St. James division, Montreal, St. Sauveur and Chambly. The conservatives as a party made no attempt to put candidates in the field, leaving the work to the nationalist allies. Thus it was that the opponent of the government in St. James division was Mr. J. K. Lafamme, a liberal; that Mr. Marell, a liberal, was the opposition candidate in Chambly, and that Mr. Langlois, a labor-liberal, ran against the administration candidate in St. Sauveur. The contest was waged with even more than the usual fierceness in Quebec, the conservatives of course supporting the candidates brought out by their allies. The result, however, was not what was anticipated. The government carried two of the seats, and the labor man won in the third. If the new member for St. Sauveur supports the opposition, the government will be no worse off than it was before, for they captured St. James division, which Mr. Bourassa had won last year. But the labor member may not care to sit in opposition and Mr. Gouin may find a new supporter on most of the questions coming before the legislature. For the conservatives the elections bring no consolation whatever—except that they show there is trouble among the liberals—Globe.
