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## TORONTO BANDIT'S CAR DISCOVERED

### Blood-stained Bag Also Found And Many Sterling and Bank Cheques

Toronto, July 30.—One definite step toward a solution of the \$52,000 Toronto bank robbery mystery, in which six unknown desperadoes held up bank messengers at Jordan and Melinda streets last Tuesday morning, was taken today when the police recovered the robbers' car in an isolated barn on the Dunlop farm, about ten miles northeast of Toronto, city limits. It was found by W. R. Sexton, a constable of the Toronto police, and was being shown over the farm.

Examination of the car revealed two of the stolen bags, one of which was blood stained. Inside, in one of the bags, a constable was detecting that a runner had been one of the bandits was wounded in the running fight with the messengers. The bags also contained a large number of dollars, and a note from the Bank of Montreal, the Bank of Commerce, the Sterling Bank and the Bank of Nova Scotia. The car which bears the license number "38-107," is maroon or wine color about the body, with black leather top and wheels.

The car will be examined for fingerprints or any other marks by which the robbers could be traced.

The recovery of the car on the Dunlop farm bears out the belief, held by many quarters, that the robbers' flight never touched the lake shore road, but instead, after going west in the city until their trail was cut, turned north and doubled back, leaving the city at the north-east border.

The developments also lend corroboration to the belief that the robbers
