MR. JAMES STOUT

The funeral of the late James Stout took place on Saturday from his late residence on Duncan St. east. R. as Section Foreman for many years, having retired on a pension a short time ago. Besides a widow, he leaves three sons and two daughters. The daughters are Mrs. Harold Russell of Newcastle and Miss Bessie at home. The sons are James of Minnesota, Hewson of the 26th Battalion, St. John and Gordon, I. C. R. conductor of Campbellton. Also an aged mother, and three brothers. The mother resides in Bathurst with her son Jerry, and Alex. resides in St. John, conducting a furniture store there, and one brother resides in the west.
