Agriculture

Too much Milk in Spring.

There is an "overproduction" of fresh made butter in April, May and June. As an inevitable consequence, the price is knocked down below the point of profit. The time was when it was necessary to force this butter on the market while the prices were at their lowest, but the demand of consumers, is now so widespread, that the butter must be fresh from the churn, no longer leaves room for the large surplus of the spring and early summer months, to be carried forward to a season of short supply. Hence we see the over supply at this season of the year, and in consequence of the late fall and winter months. Oats and butterine now come in with the advent of cold weather to expand the supply, so that panic prices are not worth the least. Especially does this course commend itself to the patrons of creameries now operating in the State.

Now is the time to consider this matter and to prepare to carry it out. We speak from a long experience, having run a winter dairy for many years, in saying there is no plausible argument against this course which there is very much to commend it. The care of the cows and the care of the milk will not so much interfere with other duties as in the busier season of summer; if the herd is run, as ought to be, as the breeding herd also, the care of the cows will be a better advantage in winter in summer.

True, cows in milk must have warm quarters, good feed and good care. So, too, they must not be fresh in milk, if they are to lose it. It is the one case that in the other. Since farmers have learned how little it costs to provide warm quarters for stock, it is now being admitted that the care of the cows is accountable for neglects in this matter.

Miscellaneous.

Never feed whole grain to the cows, it pays well to have it ground. A manure that is permanent is not soluble; and, if not soluble, it will never enter the roots of plants. Two hundred pounds dissolved bones will produce all the fertilizing effects of one thousand pounds of bone dust. The London Gardener, says:—"The sooner the manure is dissolved, the better, in order to make them grow vigorously, must be cut back to bare stems, allowing two or three buds, the better."

Corn, says the *National Live Stock Journal*, in the case of the farm horse, as well as other horses, not because it is not sufficiently nutritious, but because it makes too much fat and not enough muscle.

The proper time to roll meadows is as soon after frost is out of the ground as the turf will bear the horses' feet without pushing deep holes in the soil. The roller serves a double purpose, in compacting the earth about grass roots loosened by frost, and to prevent the soil from being so loose as to be out of the way in cutting grass. The larger stones should first be picked up and removed.

When a new milch cow has her calf taken from her, she will often hold the milk, apparently for the purpose of saving it for her offspring. It will require kindness and patience to overcome this habit. The operation of milking is pleasant for the animal, and if she is given a mess of warm food while being milked her attention will be so directed that she will yield without remembering her calf. It is important to milk clean from the first, as retention of milk in the udder injures it and tends to decrease the yield.

When a cheese which has been much salted and kept dry is washed several times in soft water and then laid in a cloth moistened with wine or vinegar, it gradually loses its salt, and if it becomes a rich cheese, and if it is kept in a cool place, it becomes soft and mellow. This simple method of improving cheese is worth knowing. It is generally practiced in Switzerland, where cheeses are kept stored for many years, and if they were not very salt and dry, worms soon become the prey of worms and mites.
