vindled the sick Children's Hospital, the Home for Incurables and Various Private Individuals by Means of Forgery and Fraud-Detective Slemin Covers Himself With Glory by Securing the Apprehension of a Man for Whom the Detective Department Has Been Looking for Many Months.

Thomas G. Mathieson, 910 King-street west, is in one of the cells at Police Headquarters, charged with fraud. The prisoner was arrested by Detective Slemin at the house of Rabbi A. Lazarus, 272 Georgestreet, at 4.30 yesterday afternoon. If the suspicions of the detective department are prrect the arrest is an important one. Mathieson is the man who in the name of charity and religion has obtained various sums, ranging from \$100 down, from different persons during the past 12 months, by pretending to represent the Sick Children's Hospital, the Home for Incurables, the Howland Memorial Fund and various private individuals. His capture was the outcome of his attempt to work Rabbi Lazarus.

What Led to His Arrest.

Yesterday morning a man about 38 years of age, dressed in a neat dark suit, and wearing a white tie, which gave him a clerical appearance, called on the rabbi at his residence. He represented himself as one of the executors of the will of the late Elizabeth Joseph, and showed him the fol-lowing, which he claimed was an extract of the will:

Extract from the probated will of Mrs. Elizabeth Joseph, deceased. Dated Decem-ber 31st, 1803. Clause III. And I, the said Elizabeth Joseph, do will and devise the following sums to the follow-ing gentlement, to be by them applied as here-in stated.

Hon, Samuel H. Blake the sum of two housand dollars (\$2000), to be by him used to alloviate the sufferings of the poor. Rev. C. H. Dixon the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000), to be by him used to help the poor in connection with the Episcopal

Bullin-ger of this city for materials purchased on Feb. 6, 1893. Wiman, being in urgent straits for money, directed the cashier of the order of Mr. Bullinger and, instead of transmiting it to him in part psyment of the scount, deliberately forged the name of E. W. On the left hand corner the cheque was marked in red ink, "Ac IMP., 176," and initialed "I.C.H." He also produced a cheque dated Dec. 31.

Mathieson explained that the sums mentioned in the will used up all the available cash of the estate, and that there were some pressing debts, amounting to a few hundred dollars. He suggested that the rabbi take
