Toronto.

Toronto, March 4.—Receipts at the  
Union stockyards were 98 cars, with  
1,573 cattle, 76 calves, 1,509 hogs, 233  
sheep and lambs and 28 horses. There  
was a comparatively light run at the

market today, and buying in consequence  
was a little more active than it otherwise  
would have been. Prices were good and  
steady at last week's closing figures, but  
not higher on an average. An extra  
choice heifer, weighing 1,330 pounds, was  
sold at \$7.40, but this was an exception  
and the top figure for the day. General  
run of prices ran from \$6 to \$6.90 for  
good choice butchers. Good cows and  
bulls firm. Sheep and lambs are still  
scarce and poor in quality. Prices are  
firm. Hogs are firm at \$9.50, fed and  
watered, one lot selling at \$9.60.
