well done St. Andrews. He next pointed out the great advantages resulting to the Town of St. Andrews from the construction of the Railway—and sat down amidst great cheering.

D. S. MORRISON, Esq., next addressed the meeting. He began by apologising for the absence of some of the directors who were unavoidably detained from the meeting. He then stated that the directors had not been for some months in a position to call a public meeting, as they had little information to communicate of a definite character, but that now their prospects were most favourable. He reviewed the history of the project from its commencement in 1845, congratulated the public upon the present flattering state of the enterprise, and lauded the indefatigable and praiseworthy exertions of the deputation, acknowledging his former disbelief that they could accomplish so much in England. He referred to the steps which had been, and are now taken, by the directors for a prompt and vigorous commencement of the work, and called upon the shareholders and others to lend their aid in obtaining subscriptions and paying deposits. He earnestly urged the necessity of liberally meeting the generous assistance offered in London, and of the County of Charlotte in particular taking a leading part in the good work, whatever assistance might be obtained elsewhere. He expressed the most confident expectation that the investment would be profitable in a pecuniary point of view, and alluded to some of the advantageous results which would accrue to this County from the construction of the road. He concluded by strenuously urging the need of immediate and vigorous exertions to dispose of the remaining stock, and to secure the payment of the legal deposit.

CAPT. P. SMITH next addressed the meeting—and observed that he was convinced of the benefits resulting from the construction of the railway.—The project was one in which we are all interested—was true that for many years, the trade of the Town had fallen off—but the energies of the people were not paralysed—they all made a living.—Let us go to work at once, said he, and if it is required, get a silver wheelbarrow and golden spade and commence the Railway instant. Our friends in England will then be satisfied that we are in earnest, and that all they require. Come forward then, and let it be the pride of every man in this County, to be able to say, that he helped to make the railway.

Several spirited resolutions were passed unanimously by the meeting—among others a vote of thanks to Capt. Robinson and M. H. Perley Esq. for their indefatigable exertions in London in promoting the interest of the Company—also to the Directors for their perseverance in overcoming all the difficulties they had to encounter, and in placing the Company in the position to insure the successful termination of the enterprise. The meeting also expressed most hearty and with three cheers, their opinion, that not an hour should be lost commencing active operations.

It was then moved that the chairman leave the chair, and that D. S. Morrison Esq. take the same, when a cordial vote of thanks was given to Geo. F. Campbell Esq., for his services as chairman.
