

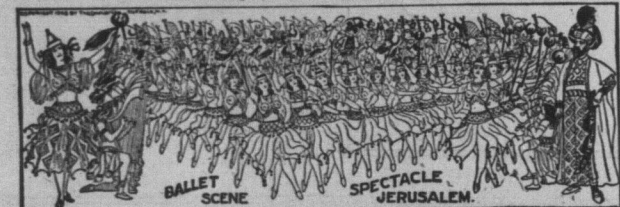

**REL PULLED BOY TO DEATH.**

Francis Bergeron Found Drowned in Cornwall Canal.  
Cornwall, June 3.—A peculiar drowning accident took place here Wednesday night. Francis Clarence Bergeron, the 14-year-old son of Francis Bergeron, went fishing after school and failed to return.  
A search was instituted, and yesterday morning his father saw the end of a fishing rod sticking up in the old canal, between the lower locks. When he pulled it up the body of his son came to the surface. The line was wrapped several times around one hand, and attached to the hook was a big eel.  
It is thought that the lad, while fishing off the lock gate, hooked the eel, and, in the struggle to land it, was pulled into the water and held down by the line till he drowned.  
Foreigner Killed.  
Winnipeg, June 3.—About two o'clock yesterday afternoon a foreigner walking along the tracks in the C.P.R. yards stepped aside to get out of the way of a yard engine and stepped directly in front of a locomotive, approaching in the opposite direction. He was struck by the cowcatcher and thrown beneath the wheels and almost instantly killed. The body was abandoned.  
Brakeman Killed.  
Moose Jaw, N.W.T., June 3.—F. S. Reid, a C.P.R. brakeman, was accidentally killed at Pasqua Wednesday. He caught his foot in a frog and was run down by an approaching train. It is understood the young man resided in Arrprior, Ont., where the body will be sent.  
Both Legs Cut Off.  
Tweed, June 3.—Bert Carr, a carter of this place, had both legs cut off here about 10 o'clock Wednesday night by the Bay of Quinte Express. It is supposed he tried to cross the track when he was caught, as he was not noticed by any person when the accident happened. He was taken to Peterboro yesterday morning.  
Took Paris Green.  
Montreal, June 3.—A laboring man named Joseph Saranac took a dose of Paris green and expired in a short time. He had been distressed for some time.

Gamey at Owen Sound.  
Owen Sound, June 3.—A convention of the North Grey Liberal-Conservative Association was held here yesterday afternoon at which George M. Boyd was again chosen standard bearer. After the convention a public meeting was held. The hall was filled up to the doors at the afternoon meeting with farmers from the surrounding townships, who listened to Mr. Gamey for two hours, the greatest interest being manifested throughout his narration. Last night the hall was crowded to the doors, and hundreds could not gain admission. The people accorded Mr. Gamey a magnificent reception.  
A New Emigrant Service.  
London, June 3.—(C. A. P.)—The Daily News learns on good authority that negotiations are in progress between the Canadian Government and Messrs. Peterson of Newcastle, the Whitworth Company and Low Walker, regarding an emigrant service from the continent to the Dominion. If successful, a fortnightly service from Rotterdam, Havre and Fiume is named, receiving a yearly subsidy of £30,000.

Fishermen Saved Vessel.  
St. John's, Nfld., June 3.—The American herring catcher A. H. Nicholson of Bucksport, Maine, adrift in an ice box all winter, sailed into Bonne Bay Wednesday. The Nicholson's crew abandoned her on Jan. 29. Five Newfoundland fishermen boarded the vessel on April 5, forty

To Save Morocco.  
London, June 3.—A despatch to The Times from Tangier says that Mohammed El Torres has appealed to the tribes to capture Raisuli, saying that this alone can save Morocco from invasion.  
Mentor Tired of Island.  
Montreal, June 3.—There is a report here to the effect that Mr. Mentor, the chocolate king, who purchased the Island of Anticosti and spent \$1,500,000 on it since he took possession, will shortly abandon his little kingdom and return permanently to old France. Mr. Mentor is expected in Quebec within a month.  
Buying Right of Way.  
Montreal, June 3.—The C.P.R. are buying the right of way, preparatory to building a line from Lachine Bridge down the south side of the canal, to Cote St. Paul.

The Junction Club.  
Toronto, June 3.—Attorney-General Gibson at noon yesterday heard the argument of E. F. B. Johnston, K. C., on behalf of the Toronto Recreation Club why its charter should not be revoked by the Government. H. H. Dewar, K. C., appeared for the Crown. Mr. Johnston stated that he would not cancel the charter without giving Mr. Johnston an opportunity to get an injunction.  
New South Wales Suffers.  
London, June 3.—(C. A. P.)—Owing to the depression in New South Wales and dissatisfaction with the working of the arbitration court small capitalists and thrifty well-to-do men are abandoning their property in Sydney and leaving in twos and threes by every boat for Canada and America.  
French Naval Budget.  
Paris, June 3.—The naval budget distributed to the members of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday provides total appropriations of \$60,000,000, which is \$1,050,000 in excess of the budget for the current year. A general re-organization of the coast defence is also provided for.
