determination of the $G$ buernment to abolish negro slavery in the French colonies, and that in their course they would be guided by the example and the experience of Great Britain.
We have no accounts from the theatre of civil war in Switzerland of a later date than 22 nd ult, when there was a probability that peace would soon be restored in the Valais. The point at issuc between the belhgerent parties was simply thes ;-The democrats of Muntigni accuse the aristocrats of Sion, or Upper Yalais, of emasporing with the Furort agranst the ar indi pendence, and the fatter charge the lower Vulaisiuns with the commission of orcesses wheh render a federal intervention inevitablr. 'This last course, however, is opposed by the majority of the Cantons, as an attempt aganst thear privileges, and, if persisted in, may create a gencral agitation throughout Switzerland.
The Pope has addressed a letter to the Roman Catholic arch. bishops and bishops, calling their attention to the effirts which are being made by varous Bible Socictios, and particularly by the Christian Siciety of New York, to produce religious dissent in Italy. A letter in the Temes, referring to the state of the country, says :-"It must be admitted, that a great and generally epr ad discontent prevails in [taly, Tuscany excepted, and that, if great changes do not speedity take place in the different administratoons, events unfortunate tor this country, and perhaps for Europe, cannot fail to aris.."
The persecution of the Baptists is carried on with even unusual rigor in Denmark.
A wonan has been eondemed to death in Madeira for denying that the wafer used in the Mass is the body of Christ. Several religrous socetics lave petitioned the interference of the British Government, especially as the Judge who condemacd her is employed in one of the British Cunmission Courts.

## AMERICA.

John L. Brown, condemned to death for assisting a fellow: creature to escape liom bondage, and regain his natural rights, has, after being scourged, been pardoned by the Governor of South Carolina, and released from confinement.
Ex-Governor Dorr has been sentenced to the Penctentiary for life, for the prominent share he took in the late Rhode Island rebellion.
War is to all all appearence about to break out between the Mormons at Nauvoo and the surrounding population. The former having destroged a printing press in the city, and annulled the arrest of these engared in the riot.

The Bidle in Schools.-The Grand Jury of Philadelphia, after a prolonged investigation into the causes of the recent terrible riots in that city, present as follows: "We ascribe the causes which led to the riots to the efforts of a portion of the community to exclude the Bible from public schools." Whercupon the Roman Catholics held a public meeting, and published an address, wherein they "explicitly deny that they have at any time, or in any manner, made any effort to cxclude the Bible from the public schools; and declare, in the most solemn manner, that they never designed, desired, nor attempted to cxclude the Bible from the schools." Americans may therefore consider the danger of having their children trained without the Bible as at an end.

A Sabbath Convention is to be held at Saratoga on the 28th August, "to consult on the best ways aud means of promoting, by example, by the diffusion of information, and other kind moral influences, the due observance of the Lord's day." We hope Cangda will be represented, as it is time that more attention were turned to this matter.

The disgusting custom of making the park in Ne: York a vast bar-room on the fourth of July, is this year to be abolished.

There are now connected with the various crangelical forcign missions fiom the United States, 32,259 native communicants, and 32,915 scholars; and with the forcign missionary stations under the care of European evangelical Christians, 139,974 native communicants, and 89,297 sholars.

The farmers in the southern part of Virgina, commenced cot. ting their grain more than three weeks ago; new flour has already made its appearance in the Southren markets. The grain crops in the castern part of Pennsplvania will be ready for the sichle two weeks carlier this summer than last.

Mr. George Snycer, a well-known brickmaker of PhiladeIphip, is now contemplating an order for 30,000 bricks, for Mr. Gibbons, a gentleman in London.
