What was the name and address of every group or organization receiving assistance from (a) Recreation Canada (b) Sport Canada (c) Sport Participation Canada in each fiscal year (i) 1971-72 (ii) 1972-73 (iii) 1973-74 and what was the amount of assistance received in each case?—Sessional Paper No. 301-2/1,247.

No. 1,702—*Mr. Elzinga*

1. In 1974, what was the amount of money spent throughout Canada on the National Exchange Programme for senior citizens?

2. How much was spent in each province and who received the grants?—Sessional Paper No. 301-2/1,702.

Mr. Reid, Parliamentary Secretary to the President of the Privy Council, presented,—Returns to the foregoing Orders.
