When one of my hon, friend's colleagues in that group will from his place in this house take the responsibility of trying to lend colour to the statements made by hon, gentlemen opposite, we have grave doubt about his being entirely progressive in his ideas, because hon, gentlemen whatever they may claim in the house, go out into their constituencies and invariably tell their electorate that they are for a lower tariff than was ever received from a Liberal party; they try to secure votes that are naturally Liberal, on the ground that they are more radical in this regard than the Liberal party has even been. It has never been directed very seriously against hon. gentlemen opposite, indeed my good friend, the hon. member for Wetaskiwin (Mr. Irvine) has gone to the extent of saying that there is no need to hold up the sins of the party who sit on the opposite side of the house, because they are beyond recall, the electorate are through with them. But he devotes a great deal of attention to the Liberal party in Liberal centres in western Canada.

An hon. MEMBER: They all do.

Mr. STEWART (Edmonton): I suppose they do. I quite concur in the amendment moved by the hon. gentleman the other night. We do want the electors of western Canada to know where the Liberal party stands with
