ALLEGED CONTRADICTIONS CONCERNING OERLIKON PRODUCED DEFENCE SYSTEM

Mr. Don Boudria (Glengarry—Prescott—Russell): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of National Defence concerning the Oerlikon affair.

In his letter dated October 2, 1986 and addressed to my colleague from Renfrew—Nipissing—Pembroke the Minister wrote, and I quote:

The Oerlikon-Burhle project met all specifications— including the requirement that it be fully operational in any kind of weather.

I have here a document from Oerlikon Aerospace which contradicts the Minister, so my question is this: Why did he give such assurances concerning a \$1 billion project, knowing as he did that such was not the case?

Hon. Perrin Beatty (Minister of National Defence): Because, Mr. Speaker, the evaluation team which looked at Oerlikon and the other proposals found that the Oerlikon proposal was able to shoot down anything which was able to fly in any weather.

MINISTER'S POSITION

Mr. Don Boudria (Glengarry—Prescott—Russell): Mr. Speaker, I am glad the Minister said that. I also have a document from the Department of National Defence which states that it is essential "that the LLAD system deployed in defence of the brigades—" not just in the air "—be capable of defending in all weather conditions". How can the Minister justify spending that kind of money? How can he justify the response he just made when it is clearly in contradiction to both the Oerlikon document and the review made by the Minister's own department, which I have right here in my hand? How can he explain that?

Hon. Perrin Beatty (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, the review which was made by my department was anxious to determine whether or not the Oerlikon system would be capable of shooting down anything able to fly and the response was, yes it would.

Mr. Speaker: The Hon. Member for Western Arctic.

Mr. Cassidy: It shot down the Government.

An Hon. Member: You guys never could fly.

Mr. Gauthier: You never could fly in your life.

POSSIBLE VISIT BY POPE TO FORT SIMPSON, N.W.T.
